NANCHISHAN MAY HAVE TO BE ABANDONED — TAFEI, Formosa, (AP) — Nationalist planes bombed Red islands Wednesday north and south of the menaced Nationalist garrison on Nanchishan. Signs multiplied that the island outpost 140 miles northwest of Formosa may have to be abandoned. An attempt to pull off the 5,000-man garrison from Nanchishan now appears very much in the cards. If it happens, it is expected to be an all-Nationalist affair, contrasted with the pullout 80 miles north of Nanchishan of the garrison from the Tachens under the covering guns of the U. S. 7th Fleet.

That a paved highway be built from the North End of the Island in Kings County to connect with the Wood Island's ferry was emphasized by Harvey Douglas (L—Second Kings) when he resumed his speech on the Draft Address in the Legislature yesterday.

"All I can say to that is, that if the fishermen are making \$2,000 in a season (according to Mr. Saville) and \$100 a day (according to Mr. Kitson), then there are not enough farmers fishing," he said.

### Russian Scientist

CLAIMED BY CANADA — The Russians last April established two permanent research stations on polar drift ice. One, the pamphlet said, was set up at 86 degrees north 17 degrees, 45 minutes west. Its last known position was 89 degrees north, 54 degrees, 30 minutes west.

This means the drift station at one time was working in territory claimed by Canada and near the north pole.

Canada has never put scientists on a drift station in the Arctic ocean but the United States occupied and worked on three ice islands after the Second World War: T-2 and T-3. The Americans abandoned the last of these stations some time ago.

Canadian government maps for at least the last 50 years have shown Canada's claims of territory right up to the north pole, a northern affairs department official said.

The claim encompasses all territory bounded on one side by a straight line running from the Yukon-Alaska border to the north pole and on the other side by a line running directly from the channel dividing Ellesmere island and Greenland to the pole.

### NO DECLARATION

The official said, however, that as far as he knows, Canada never made any formal declaration of the extent or basis of its claims. There was no question, though, of Canadian ownership of the land within the two lines.
