

# Leaders In Both Leagues Lose Yesterday Evening

**PHILADELPHIA (AP)** — Bill White's three-run homer and the seven-hit pitching of Chris Short helped Philadelphia Phillies to a 5-3 victory over the National League-leading Los Angeles Dodgers Friday night.

The Dodgers' magic number for their second straight pennant remained at two as a result of the defeat in his first of a three-game series with the Phillies, and the rainout at Pittsburgh of the game between the second-place Pirates and the third-place San Francisco Giants.

The Dodgers trailed 2-1 in the seventh and had a chance to win and clinch at least a tie for the pennant. But, with reliever Ron Perrano on the mound, the Phillies scored three runs to put the game away.

John Briggs walked to start the seventh and was sacrificed to second by Cookie Rojas. Dick Groat hit to the right side for an out that advanced Briggs to third. Dodger manager Walt Alston ordered the power-hitting Allen intentionally walked to get White, who had been benched at the start because the Dodgers opened with southpaw Claude Osteen.

**HITS 22ND HOMER**

White, who came into the game when right-hander Bob Miller relieved earlier, slammed the first pitch from Perranoski high over the right-field wall for his 22nd home run and three Philadelphia tallies.

The Dodgers got two more runs in the ninth. Dick Schofield and Wes Parker walked. Dick Groat threw out John Roseboro with the runners advancing and then he threw out Al Ferrara with Schofield scoring.

Wills singled to left, scoring Parker and Willie Davis doubled, sending Wills to third. Lou Johnson flied to short center and Tony Taylor grabbed the ball on the run, ending the game.

**BALTIMORE (AP)** — Harmon Killebrew hit home runs off Dave McNally and Jim Palmer Friday night as Minnesota Twins whipped American League champion Baltimore 10-7 and 8-2.

Bob Allison and Rich Rollins also homered in the opening game victory against McNally, while Don Mincher hit a three-run homer in the fifth inning of the nightcap against Palmer. Killebrew's homers were his 35th and 39th.

**ST. LOUIS (AP)** — Ed Spiezio's two-run homer and Dick Hughes' three-hit pitching carried St. Louis Cardinals to a 2-0 victory over Chicago Cubs Friday night.

**NEW YORK (AP)** — New York Mets, stymied by Larry Dierker's perfect game through eight innings, erupted in the ninth inning on a double by Ed Bressoud and Ron Hunt's pinch single for a 1-0 victory over Houston Astros Friday night.

Dierker, 29 years old, eight days ago, had not allowed a base runner through eight innings, retiring 24 Mets in a row. Then Bressoud led off the ninth by hitting a sinking line drive that Lee Maye just missed getting to in left field.

# Clair Still Crying With Comfortable EFC Lead

**TORONTO (CP)** — Coach Frank Clair of Ottawa Rough Riders, who has been accused of crying from hunger with a loaf of bread under each arm, is still crying.

One would expect him to be all smiles when his team is leading the Eastern Football Conference with an 8-1 record and has a four-point lead over Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

# Battle Rages Over Nat. League's MVP

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Who is the National League's most valuable player?

Pittsburgh manager Harry Koufax insists it's Roberto Clemente.

Sandy Koufax of Los Angeles, though, has made a strong bid, winning 26 games, including his important 2-1 decision over St. Louis Thursday night.

The triumph reduced to two the Dodgers' pennant-clinching number.

There seems to be a general feeling that pitchers are at a disadvantage in the balloting for the MVP award by baseball writers, the voters preferring instead to restrict the pitchers to the Cy Young Award.

The Young award is given to the outstanding pitcher in both major leagues.

However, Don Newcombe of the Brooklyn Dodgers captured the MVP and Young awards in 1956, the first year of the latter trophy. Koufax took both in 1963.

And the Dodgers' star southpaw has turned in a superior over-all performance this year than he did three seasons ago. He won 25 games, struck out 305 batsmen and had a 1.88 earned run average in 1963. His 26 victories in 1966 are augmented by 307 strikeouts and a 1.72 ERA.

Clemente, the veteran Pirates' outfielder, is having a great year, too. He has personal highs of 26 homers and 117 runs batted in, and although his .317 average is well below the mark that earned him the batting titles the last two years it is still fifth best in the league.

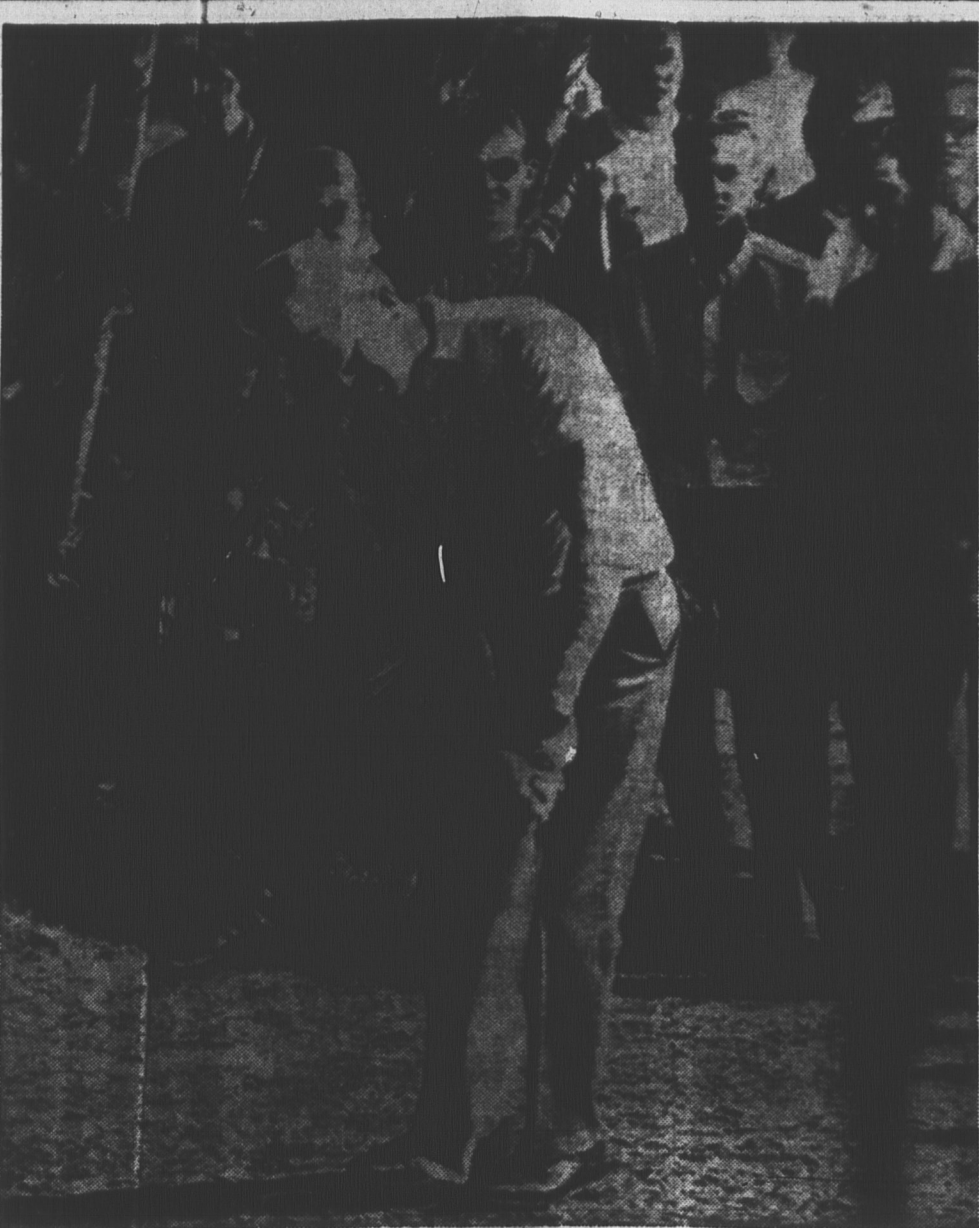
# Dodgers Are 7-5 Favorites

**RENO, Nev. (AP)** — Los Angeles Dodgers were rated prohibitive favorites to win the National League pennant Friday and 7-to-5 choices over Baltimore Orioles in the World Series.

In listing odds before Friday night's games, a bookmaker made the Pittsburgh Pirates 7-to-1 long shots in the National League race.

The Dodgers had a two-game edge over the Pirates with three games left for each team. A combination of a Los Angeles victory with a Pittsburgh defeat, two Los Angeles victories or two Pirate defeats would give the pennant to the Dodgers.

# Southerners Take Lead In Second Round Of Open

**VANCOUVER (CP)** — Professionals Don Massengale of Jacksboro, Tex. and Randy Glover of Florence, S.C. fought for the lead Friday at the halfway mark of the Canadian open golf tournament.

Both have put together two under 140s on the first 36-holes of the \$100,000, 72-hole tournament. They were tied in third place after the first round with one-under 70s and matched their scores Friday.

Rod Funnell, a pro from Spokane, Wash., Chi Chi Rodriguez of Puerto Rico, and Canadian George Knudson of Toronto shared second place one stroke back of the leaders.

First-round leader Hugh Royer of Columbus, Ga., with a three-under 68, watched his game fall apart with a series of three unplayable balls and took four-over-par 75 on his second round to move back into a ninth-place tie with three other American pros.

Among the pros cut from the tourney because they failed to make the 150 cutoff were Ken Venturi of San Francisco, the U.S. Open champ in 1964, Billy Maxwell of Indianapolis, Stan Leonard of Vancouver, and two of three Commonwealth entries, Russ Newdick and Bob Charies, both of Christchurch, N.Z.

Also to fall by the wayside was amateur Mike Reason of Kenmore, Wash., who led qualifiers for the tournament with a 69.

A tie will result if the Dodgers lost two of their three weekend games against Philadelphia while the Pirates swept all three from San Francisco, or if the Dodgers lost all three to the Phils and Pittsburgh took two from the Giants.

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# Campbell Goes For Record In Important CFL Game

Saskatchewan Roughriders flanker Hugh Campbell meets his personal paties Sunday in a Western Football Conference game in which he could equal and break a CFL record in the books for seven years.

Campbell has caught 15 touchdowns this year, one short of the record established by Ernie Pitts of Winnipeg Blue Bombers in 1959. It is against Bombers Campbell has had most success this season. It is the Bombers the Roughriders play Sunday.

Five of Campbell's touchdowns have been scored in two previous encounters with the Bombers. Three of them came in an Aug. 7 clash in Regina; two were scored in Winnipeg Sept. 11.

In that second game, Campbell caught a pass for the winning points with less than two minutes remaining, and the goat of the play was defensive back Dick Thornton, who tripped away while trying to knock the ball away.

There is a chance Thornton won't be around to be victimized again. He has been stricken with a virus infection and may not play. If he does play, it could be quarterback in place of Kenny Ploen, a doubtful starter because of a bruised kidney.

**ALS MEET STAMPS**

Two eastern teams will play in the West this weekend. Montreal Alouettes are in Calgary today for a game against the Stampeders while Hamilton Tiger-Cats play Edmonton Eskimos in Edmonton.

The Bombers are in Regina Sunday for that game against the Roughriders, and Hamilton moves on to Vancouver Monday to meet British Columbia's Lions.

The Montreal-Calgary clash will be nationally televised by the CBC beginning at 11 p.m. EDT. The Winnipeg-Saskatchewan game will be seen at 2 p.m. CDT on the CTV western network, and the Hamilton-B.C. game will be shown at 8 p.m. PDT, also on the CTV western network.

Key lineup changes shape up this way:

For Winnipeg, Ploen is doubtful. If he does not dress, Thornton will quarterback. If Thornton is still out with the flu, unproven Rich Badar will be quarterback.

For Calgary, fullback Willie Ross is out with a bad knee and Bill Goods will go in his place.

For Edmonton, Bill Redell will be back at quarterback, a position he hasn't played since the second game of the season. Regular pivot Randy Kerbow has a cracked bone in his throwing hand and will play as a flaker instead. Halfback Jim Thomas is likely to return after missing four games with a charliehorse.
