NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The balance due by Provincial governments on the 30th June, to the Merchants Bank of P. E. Island was \$64,076, and to the Merchants Bank of Halifax \$100,684. These amounts will have been considerably reduced by the half-yearly subsidy payable in advance on the 1st July.

The news from Cassair indicates that the result of the British Columbia election will be a tie—nineteen ministerialists to nineteen oppositionists. Premier Turner, it is also said, will not resign. Political news from the Coast province is likely for some time to be interesting rather than edifying.

Winchester, King Alfred's capital, has just celebrated its millennium as a municipal corporation. The Mayor of Winchester lays claim to authority antedating any royal grant, Boornwulf having assumed the government of the town in 898. It is only a few years ago that the city celebrated its 700th anniversary on the strength of the charter granted by Henry II.

A French paper, the Temps, thinks that Spain is no favorite of the ocean. It says: "If it is true that with the exception of a single vessel, the entire Spanish fleet has been destroyed, it is a disaster almost as crushing as the destruction of the great Armada. Once more the sea has betrayed Spain to the profit of the Anglo-Saxon race, which appears, no matter under what flag it fights, whether it be the Stars and Stripes or Union Jack, to be the favorite on the ocean."

In view of the belief expressed that the fire at the residence of Mr. F. L. Hazard this morning was caused by the electric wires, and also the belief that the wires caused some trouble in the vicinity of a window in the tower of the Baptist Church last night, it would seem that the time has arrived for the appointment of an electrical inspector. The Fire Board have been agitating the appointment of such an officer for some time past, and have offered to pay half his salary, but so far the City Council have not seen their way clear to take action.

The Philippine Islands are described by U. S. Consul Williams, of Manila, as comprising 150,000 square miles and having a population of from eight to ten millions. The island of Luzon, on which Manila is situated, is larger than the states of New York and Massachusetts combined and has a population of 5,000,000. The island of Mindano is nearly if not quite as large as Luzon. In all there are about 2000 islands in a land and sea area of 1200 miles north and south and 2400 miles east and west. The hemp exports in 1897 were 914,955 tons and sugar exports 1,582,904 tons. Of the former 42 per cent went to the United States and 55 per cent of the latter to the same country. The average annual exports of these two products to the United States for the past ten years has been nearly 9 millions of dollars. There is only one railway 123 miles long in all the islands; this extends from Manila to Dagupan. It is a first-class road and pays 10 per cent. Its stock is guaranteed by the government at the rate of eight per cent for 99 years. There are only 25,000 Europeans in all the islands and 12,000 of these are in Manila. Trade is largely in the hands of the English, Spanish and German houses.

It was noted a few days ago that Lord Wolseley, commander-in-chief of the British army, and General Miles, commander of the United States army, are in accord in believing that liquor is worse than useless to armies in war in hot climates. Also that General Kitchener has prohibited it in the Sudan campaign. A further testimony although a modified one comes from another noted general. Sir William Lockhart, who commanded the British army in the late Indian frontier war, has said to a reporter:

"It is wise to be sparing in the use of stimulents. The less the men get the better. Yet a good supply should always be on hand. My men in Tirah usually got a wineglassful of rum twice a week. If a difficult task was to be performed, or if the weather was cold, extra rations were given, and the total abstainers and the Mohammedans received extra rations of tea."

A wineglassful of rum twice a week is not prohibited, but some of our toppers would not feel that there was much difference. And the fact is, if men can get along with two drinks a week, it is quite difficult, as the Ottawa Journal remarks, to see that they need any.

BRITISH TRADE WITH AUSTRALIA.

The Australian colonies are by far the largest and best customers of Great Britain and her possessions, which enjoy the greater portion of the oversea import and export trade, which, including that of New Zealand, represented in 1897, according to the Victorian Government Statist, a total value of £137,810,956, against £128,968,236 in 1896, and £114,566,980 in 1895. Of this enormous trade New South Wales alone possesses nearly one third, the figures for 1897, according to the colonial Government Statist, being £45,493,422, as follows:—Australian colonies, £17,776,943; United Kingdom, £16,285,897; other British possessions, £1,429,025; United States, £4,350,196; France (including New Caledonia and Tahiti), £1,929,823; Germany (including German New Guinea and other possessions in the Pacific), £1,796,061; Belgium, £746,097; other countries, £1,151,160. The bulk of the Australasian exports of domestic produce is taken by the United Kingdom, the total value of these, in 1897, being £8,728,828, against £8,375,883 in 1896, and £9,371,418 in 1895. In 1892 the amount was £,653,915. In 1897 the imports from the United Kingdom amounted to £7,557,069, against £7,190,115 in 1896; £6,420,107 in 1895; and £5,983,489 in 1894. There has been a steady increase of trade between New South Wales and Great Britain, interrupted only by the great financial and commercial panic of some few years ago, the ill effects of which are rapidly disappearing; and with increased attention to colonial requirements, it is believed that in the near future this increase will become largely accelerated. There has also been an increase of trade, chiefly exports, with the United States, the figures for 1897 being—imports, £1,887,877 exports, £2,442,331. In 1893 the imports were £526,331, and the exports £626,566, a fourfold increase. Trade with France has remained almost stationary, but that with New Caledonia and Tahiti shows an increase. Although so much has been said respecting the expansion of German trade in Australia, there is little or no appearance of it in New South Wales, the imports from that country in 1897 being valued at £900,464, against £581,402 in 1892. There was a drop to £373,233 in 1893, but an increase took place in each of the succeeding years. There has been considerable fluctuations in the New South Wales exports to Germany, as shown by the following figures:—1892, £1,017,456; 1893, £979,898; 1894, £917,310; 1895, £1,141,661; 1896, £774,389; 1897, £880,440. The numerous facilities afforded for the introduction of Australian produce into the United Kingdom gives the mother country an immense advantage over its continental rivals, because the larger the value of its imports, the more considerable becomes that of the manufactures taken in exchange. Were the German tariff more liberal with regard to Australian produce, the two countries would be more encouraging. If British manufacturers are beaten by German competitors in any of the branches of industrial production, they will have only themselves to blame, as all the material advantages are at present on their side.
