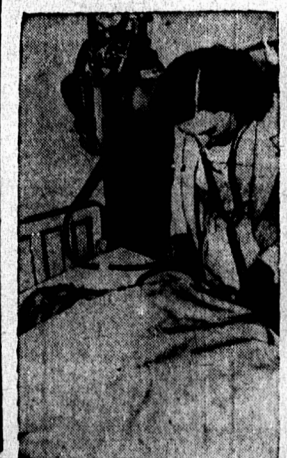
EMYVALE W. I.

SURVIVED "DEEP FREEZE"

Dr. Mary Ann Silverman is shown ministering to 24-year-old Mrs. Dorothy Mae Stevens in Chicago hospital, who amazed the medical world by living after being frozen so solid that her body temperature dropped to 64 degrees. Following administration of plasma and cortisone by doctors who know of no other case in which a person had survived a temperature below 68 degrees, the woman regained consciousness and her temperature soared from 64 to above normal. Doctors fear she may lose both arms and legs but won't know for certain for four or five days. The woman was found by police in an alley where she had fallen in a drunken stupor and where, apparently, she had laid all night in 11 degrees below zero.

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
