AMHERST, N.S. (CP) — The circle eight of Southport, P.E.I., captured the senior square dancing championship at Saturday's closing program of the 52nd Maritime winter fair here.

The Islanders were among 23 teams representing communities all over the Atlantic provinces. Second place was taken by the Halifax Corte Squares and third by the Springfield Coal Dusters.

The Halifax Courtneys walked off with first place in the junior events. Siddalls of Amherst and East Pictou rural high school wound up tied for second place and split the prize.

Six persons are in the King's County Hospital at Montague as a result of a highway accident which occurred near Murray River early Sunday morning.

In Hospital are: Hugh MacPhee (34) Heatherdale; William Nicholson (17) Kilmuir; Annie MacDonald (20) Kilmuir; George White (20) Murray River; Gerald MacKay (24) Murray Harbour; Wallace White (40) Murray Harbour.

Others injured in the two-car collision were: Brehaut MacDonnell, Hopfield; Fred Wilson, Murray River; and Malcolm MacKinnon, Murray River.

The accident occurred about 1:00 a.m. yesterday morning when a 1953 Ford driven by Mr. Acorn going to Murray River, and a 1938 Ford licensed in Quebec, driven by Mr. MacPhee coming from Murray River collided on the Commercial Highway about two miles from Murray River and a half mile south of the Greek River road.

As early a start as possible on a new ferry for the Wood Islands-Caribou route was urged by the Queens County Liberal Association in the form of a resolution at its annual meeting at the Community Centre Saturday night.

The death occurred Saturday morning in the Prince Edward Island Hospital of William J. Storey, 47, Prince Street, aged 71 years.

The late Mr. Storey, who had been in failing health for the past few months, had for the last twenty-seven years been the capable and obliging sexton at Trinity United Church and only retiring from that position on September 1st of this year.

Although of a retiring disposition, the late Mr. Storey enjoyed a wide circle of friends, all of whom will deeply regret his passing.

The death occurred suddenly yesterday at his home, 63 Victoria Avenue of John Henry McCarville at the age of 70. The late Mr. McCarville had been in his usual health upon retirement on Saturday evening but passed away in his sleep during the night.

Born in Charlottetown he was the son of the late Thomas and Bridget McCarville and as a young man went to sea. During World War I he served with the Merchant Navy and at the conclusion of hostilities joined the Royal Canadian Navy from which he retired in 1941 with the rank of Chief Petty Officer, thus serving his country in the two major conflicts.

A complete new lighting system for the City is envisaged by Councillor Elmer MacDonnell. At the regular monthly meeting of the City Council yesterday afternoon he told of the effectiveness of one of the Mercury vapour-type lamps now installed on Kent Street opposite the Rendezvous Restaurant.

Two letters from nearby residents were read to the Council and each of them expressed deep thanks to the City for the installations as the light had greatly increased the visibility on that block.

The light, known as "OV-20 Mercury Vapour Lamp," is currently in use in Verdun, Que., and is reported as giving excellent service. It is said to provide 225 per cent more light while consuming 20 per cent less power.

Mr. MacDonald said it was planned to install these lights in the city area bounded by Euston, Wilmouth, Dorchester and Pownall streets with three lights to each block.

Repairs to the breastwork at Victoria Park, damaged in recent storms, amounted to nearly \$9,000 with labour accounting for most of the expense.

The 24th annual live fox-show and the 7th annual mink show got underway at the Charlottetown Exhibition Grounds yesterday with judging of foxes commencing at nine o'clock in the morning.

Mr. Parvin Cass of Summerside will judge the foxes with the largest number of entries in four years, over 300 animals.

The mink judging will start on the completion of the fox judging and not before Thursday morning. Mr. Andy Stewart of the Hudson Bay Company, Montreal, will judge the mink. The number of mink entries is expected to be higher than last year. On display will be all types of mutation and standard mink and standard silvers, platinum and pearl platinum foxes.

The annual banquet will be held this evening.

Yesterday the M.V. Loradone docked at Souris to take on 500 cords of pulp wood after it had been previously arranged for her to take on part of her cargo at Georgetown first and then proceed to Souris. This switch in plans has led shippers in the Town to believe that the ship's underwriters had advised the captain to enter the port light fog fear of another grounding incident.

Mayor J. Arthur Peters expressed the opinion that if some thing is not done to rectify this situation the port will suffer severely from an economic standpoint. Souris is supposed to have 22 feet of water at low tide.

The question of a two-way radio for Summerside police patrol was again raised at the regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening.

Councillor Hillard Clark who suggested that the matter be investigated, and said that towns smaller than Summerside consider two-way radio to be important in police work.

On the subject of by-laws regarding building he said that present by-laws of 1937 were out dated and should be revised keeping with present conditions.

In reporting for the water and sewerage committee he expressed belief that water meters would be the fairest method of water rates. He described new work on Victoria Road, made necessary through the installation of a storm sewer.

A 1,000 case carload of peas (24,000 cans), probably the first shipment of this size ever to leave Prince Edward Island, was shipped yesterday from Summerside by the canning plant of Campbell and Burns, Central Beedee.

Mr. Campbell said yesterday that the shipment was destined for the Newfoundland market where there is a good market for all varieties of canned goods.

It is the intention of this firm, he said, to make periodic shipments of their products to Newfoundland and he expressed the hope that eventually arrangements would be completed by various shippers to have Summerside made a regular port of call by the boat from that province. This, he explained, would facilitate shipping their products, and provide for quicker delivery to the consumer.

Very good was the description applied by Judge Parvin Cass of Summerside, to the exhibits at the 24th annual Provincial Live Fox Show yesterday. The number of foxes on exhibit is 270 compared with 200 last year, which would indicate a revival of interest in the industry. The show is being held in the fox pavilion at the Exhibition Grounds. Fifteen exhibitors including one from Nova Scotia and one from New Brunswick, competed for honors.

A Charlottetown, N.S., breeder, Mr. S. U. Messenger, took top honors in yesterday's judging. He was closely followed by the George Callbeck ranch from Summerside. Mr. Gordon MacMillan from Cornwall ranked third.

The death of Thomas Gordon Ives, prominent Charlottetown business man occurred in the P. E. Island Hospital last night after an illness which required hospitalization in August. He was able to resume business to a lesser extent until a short time ago, when he returned to hospital.

Mr. Ives was born at Tryon on May, 28, 1885 the son of the late Isaac and Louise Ives, and since 1922 has conducted the T. G. Ives automobile business in Charlottetown. As a young man he worked with his father in the Ives' wood-working plant at Montague and later in the dry-goods business, from which he retired to enter the automobile field, in which he continued on moving to Charlottetown.

Mr. George Callbeck and Mr. Lowell Hancock, both of Summerside shared grand championship honors at the second day of judging at the 24th annual Live Fox Show being held at the Fox pavilion in Charlottetown. Mr. Callbeck with his adult fox "Royal 20H" took the championship in the Standard Silver class and went on to win the grand championship. Mr. Hancock, in the Standard Pearl platinum class duplicated this feat with his "O'Hanlon 12G".

Other championship winners were: Mr. S. U. Messenger for Standard Silver pup, with adult reserve championship going to Gordon MacMillan, Cornwall and to Thomas Neilson of Port Elgin. In the Standard Pearl Platinum George Callbeck took a championship and reserve grand for pups and Mr. Hancock the addition to his previously mentioned accomplishments had the reserve championship pup. Mr. Messenger had the reserve champion adult.

The death occurred suddenly at his home on Park Street of Gerald David Burgoyne, retired conductor on the Canadian National Railways, in his 62nd year. Mr. Burgoyne had retired last February on account of ill health and although a heart condition from which he was suffering restricted his activities, he was in his usual health until 8 o'clock Tuesday evening when after driving his car home, he complained to his wife of not feeling well. She called his doctor but in spite of all medical aid he passed away a half hour after he was stricken.

Air Commodore Martin Costello, air officer commanding, Maritime Air Command, on an annual tour of inspection at RCAF Station Summerside told a press conference yesterday that approach lights will be installed on airfield property at both ends of one runway at Summerside at a cost of about \$90,000.

Remembrance Day was solemnly and sincerely observed in Summerside yesterday when veterans of two world wars and naval and air force personnel formed a hollow square at the Memorial Square Cenotaph, flanked by various other military and civilian organizations and paid tribute to the memory of our fallen.

The tolling of the Trinity United Church chimes from 10:55 to 10:58 provided a solemn background for the large gathering which had assembled to join in the memorial service, presided over by Mr. F. J. McNeill, president of the No. 3 Branch of the Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L.

After two minutes silence was observed from 11:00 to 11:02 and a short poem read by Mr. McNeill.

Questioned about an earlier report that the construction of a new hangar at Summerside was being considered he said the matter was still under consideration.

Air Commodore Martin had no comment on the future strength of the station except to say that no further reduction in its present strength is contemplated. Mr. and Mrs. O'Meara and their nine children were able to get safely out of the building but lost almost all their possessions. Of a large quantity of potatoes stored in the cellar, one truckload was salvaged before flames leveled the building to the ground.

It is believed the loss was partially covered by insurance.

Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., the parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries will officially open the new R.C.M.P. barracks at Alberton at 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon of November 30th.

The chief feature of the opening will be a flag raising ceremony and the Department of Public Works will be represented by district engineer P. S. Hunter of Saint John, N. B. The R.C.M.P. will be represented at the opening by Inspector W. H. Newin, Charlottetown.

The general contractors was the firm of M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd., Summerside.

The Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board was sustained by a two to one majority but one of its proposed policies of a one desk selling was opposed by a slim majority of 285 votes in yesterday's plebiscite which saw approximately 6,000 potato producers cast their ballots.

With seven polls still to be heard from the count stands at 3,858 for the Board with 1,977 voting against it. The second question regarding the desirability of the one desk selling agency saw 2,706 voting in favor of having the Selling Agency operate with 2,991 against.

All three counties gave substantial majorities in support of the Potato Marketing Board. Kings County voted 883 to 469 for the one desk selling agency while Queens County voted 1,161 to 1,043 against the selling agency and Queens voted 1,361 to 780 against the selling agency.

The plebiscite which has been one of the most keenly contested for some time saw 20,000 ballots mailed to 172 polls throughout the province. The same polling districts, that are held in regular elections, with the exception of Charlottetown and Summerside saw voters cast their ballots from 1:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. yesterday.

Mr. George Callbeck of Summerside, again took honors at yesterday's judging at the Provincial Live Fox Show. With the completion of judging, Mr. Callbeck had the highest aggregate score of 156 and was the winner of the Hudson Bay Trophy.

In the Standard Platinum class Mr. Callbeck made a clean sweep of all the championships. Pearl Platinum for the "get of sire" entry as well as the "progeny of dam" entry and had five firsts and a second in the Standard Platiniams.

Mr. Ernest T. Mill had the reserve champion Platinum pup, a first and a third for adult female, a second for pup male and a second for adult male (light). He also took a first and second for progeny of dam groups.

Stewart were followed in the placing of wreaths by President Stanley Bryant of the Charlottetown Branch, Mrs. Lily Corrigan, president of the Ladies Auxiliary, Charlottetown Canadian Legion; the Airforce Association; Nursing Sisters (Overseas) Association and the general public.

Owen was born at Webster's Corner in the year 1903 the son of the late Joseph Baird and Catherine Ann Hughes. When he grew to manhood he settled with his bride, the former Marie Trainor of Donagh, on the farm adjoining the homestead, where he by perseverance and frugality gained a sufficient measure of earthly goods to be secure and comfortable. But the attainment of economic stability was always placed second in Owen's life, he fully realized the purpose of his creation, consequently he lived a truly Christian life, he fulfilled his duties as head of the home, where good example, love, companionship, tolerance and discipline were prevalent and the Grace of God abounded. His loss will not be confined to the home, but will be greatly felt in the community, for all his acquaintances, who were the richer by his friendship. As if it was of his own choosing, his very largely attended funeral was held at St. Patrick's Church, Fort Augustus on the first Friday of August coincidental with a practice he was devoted to from his youth.
