PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Mr. Bruneau's Resignation

Island Delegates Returning.

OTTAWA, March 22.—The whole afternoon of yesterday was taken up in a debate on the motion for a reference of Mr. Bruneau's resignation to the committee of privileges and elections.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier refused to grant a committee to investigate the facts.

The P. E. Island Government delegates who have been here pressing the Island's financial claims and other questions upon the government expect to return home today.

They presented a written memorial on the financial claims asking that they be referred to arbitration.

The questions at issue were discussed and were promised full consideration by the government.

BATTLE IMMINENT.

The Anglo-Egyptian Brigade.

Ready With Fixed Bayonets.

LONDON, March 22.—At Barcamp, Nubia, the Anglo-Egyptian force is hourly expecting an attack. During the false alarm at Hudi fort, last evening, shot was fired from an unknown quarter and the whole Brigade stood with arms at fixed bayonets. In pitch dark a highlander rushing to his place was impaled on a comrade's bayonet.

MANITOBA SCHOOL QUESTION

Archbishop Langevin's Latest Speech,

WINNIPEG, March 22.—Speaking at the reception last evening Archbishop Langevin stated that he had hopes that a settlement of the school question would be reached in a short time. It is said that greater latitude will be allowed the Roman Catholics in not too strict an interpretation of the law.

IRISH LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

Bill Passes a Second Reading

Without Division Amid Cheers.

LONDON, March 22.—In the House of Commons the Irish Local Government Bill passed a second reading without a division. Loud cheers were given.

GOVERNMENT OF INDIA.

Retirement of Lord Elgin.

LONDON, March 22.—The Standard says: We have reason to believe that the Earl of Elgin and Kincardine, vice-roy of India since 1893, desires to resign his post and that the government is considering the appointment of a new Vice-roy.

SEVERAL TALL STORIES.

Lord Dufferin's Reminiscences of Canada. Lord Dufferin presided, a few evenings ago, at an interesting lantern lecture on "Picturesque Canada," by Sir H. Cunningham, in London. The chairman said that in listening to the lecturer both Lord Dufferin and himself seemed to live the period of their stay in Canada over again. Each scene was connected with some agreeable memory in their recollections, and again filed their hearts with the most lively enthusiasm for the noble people who inhabited Canada. When they started for the colony they fell very quickly into a gale of wind, and he was lying in his berth, when two strange men dressed in long mien's boots and red shirts came at midnight to the side of his cot, and asked him if he was the Governor-General. He replied that he was, upon which they said, "We then call upon you to order the captain immediately to put into port." They thought the ship was in the most imminent danger. He replied that they had better return to their berths, otherwise the captain would put them and him into irons.

COURTING AFTER THE GALE.

After the gale there came a calm, and it was always the case in those liners that a good deal of courting took place. On board a young couple announced that they desired to be married by the captain. Lady Dufferin held the bridal gown, his daughter acted as bridesmaid, and the captain performed the ceremony for a guerdon he need not mention. The whole business was entirely illegal, and he was very glad to hear that immediately on their arrival the ceremony was again performed in a more orthodox fashion. Several incidents of a similar nature came to his knowledge during his stay in the country.

THE LADY AND THE MISSIONARY.

A missionary lived on the shores of Hudson Bay, where he ministered to the Indians. Finding his solitary life unbearable, he wrote home to his friends to send him a wife. A lady volunteered, and she arrived by the one vessel that made the voyage and returned after the stay of a fortnight. But whether the sight of the missionary walking impatiently up and down the beach caused her misgivings—(laughter)—or for some other reason, the lady repented of her determination and would not leave the ship. She informed the captain that she would return with him. The missionary tried to get the captain upon his side, and the captain informed the lady shortly afterwards that it would be his duty to fumigate the ship. (Loud laughter.) Under the circumstances she was forced to land, the missionary himself performed the ceremony of marriage—(laughter)—and they lived happily ever after. (Loud laughter.)

LORD AND LADY DUFFERIN IN A WIGWAM.

Lady Dufferin and he lived for two months in an Indian wigwam. They found it very comfortable, except when they had to stand up to dress, for the upper-part of the tent was filled with smoke from the fire that burned in the centre. Having described the Indian marriage customs, one of which enjoined the young suitor not to encounter the eyes of his father-in-law, the chairman described a great tree which he saw cut down, and which measured 220 feet. He had the rings counted, and it was seen that the plant must have been born in the reign of Edward IV.

HAVANA, March 21.—In spite of official and other denials it is believed that serious troubles for Spain in Porto Rico are imminent, and it is asserted (though the report cannot be verified at present) that the Spanish cruiser Vizcaya, when she leaves Havana, will go to Porto Rico in order to strengthen the hands of the government officials there.
