A NUMBER of truckmen were fined at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court to-day for non-payment of their license fee.

THE REV. DR. TAYLOR, the great Eastern traveller and Missionary, will deliver a lecture in the basement of the Methodist Church, to-morrow evening. Subject: "Jerusalem the City of the Great King." The wide-spread fame of Dr. Taylor as an orator will, no doubt, ensure a crowded house.

REMEMBER the Liberal-Conservative meeting at the Academy of Music this evening, at 7.30, to make arrangements for the reception of Sir Leonard Tilley and Hon. Adolphus P. Caron, Minister of Militia. All friends of the party are cordially invited to attend, and assist in giving Sir Leonard and his friend a rousing reception.

REV. WILLIAM GRANT, who was recently ordained priest at Quebec, arrived home on Saturday night. His many friends in this city will be pleased to learn that he is enjoying excellent health. He is now the guest of Bishop McIntyre. On the opening of St. Dunstan's College in September, he will take charge of the highest class, and assist Dr. Chaisson as Rector.

MAUD S. and ST. JULIEN.—It would appear that Maud S. is not to carry off the trotting honors of the season wholly unchallenged. St. Julien has arrived at Rochester, and will endeavor to beat her time if he can. As the Rochester track is one of the fastest in the United States, St. Julien is perhaps as likely to accomplish the feat he is about to undertake, there, as anywhere.

L. O. O. F.—The delegates to the E. W. Grand Lodge, which opens at Wolfville, N.S., on Wednesday next, left by steamer this morning. The following are the names: St. Lawrence Lodge—Theo. L. Chappelle, Geo. E. Hughes, Willey Lodge—A. D. White, William Worth, Colville Lodge, Somers—C. C. Carleton. The representatives from Prince Edward Lodge, Summerside, intend going via Shediac.

CHARLES BRADLAUGH, armed with a stout oak stick, attempted to force an entrance into the Imperial House of Commons on the 3rd, and was ejected by the police and ushers, after a hot struggle. He stated he would renew the attempt with force sufficient to compel an entrance. It is said that Bradlaugh will apply for a summons against the Deputy Speaker, the police, and others, for assault in resisting his entrance.

A FRENCH-CANADIAN named Marcelle was arrested a few days ago at Stanbridge, Que., station, charged with the murder of one Orris, a companion with whom he had been out fishing. The dead body of Orris was found attached to the fishing line of the accused, and bearing unmistakable marks of violence. Under the circumstances, it is not surprising that a coroner's jury returned a verdict of murder against Marcelle.

GERMANY has nearly 400,000 shoemakers and cobblers, or nearly 90 to every 10,000 of her population. This is a larger proportion than in any country except Italy and England. Italy takes the lead of all. Then come, in the order named, England and Wales, Germany, Belgium, Ireland, Denmark, France, the United States and Sweden. It is a curious circumstance that warm Italy should have within a fraction of 100 cobblers to 10,000 of the population, and cold Sweden less than 18.

The Canada Temperance Act.

THE case of Mr. Stephen Carroll, charged with violating the Canada Temperance Act, was tried at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. Mr. Hodgson, Q. C., appeared for the prosecution, and Mr. Davies, Q. C., for the defence. The violation of the act was proven by a witness—Owen McMahon—who testified that on Friday last he bought a pint of brandy from the defendant, and for it paid fifty cents. The defence made by Mr. Davies was (1) that the list of voters used by the Sheriff at the election for the adoption of the Act in this city was the list of voters for Charlottetown Common and Royalty—that being the case the election was illegal, and (2) that the Canada Temperance Act was ultra vires. The first objection as far as the list used is concerned, was admitted by Mr. Hodgson, but that they were illegally used he denied. He contended that it was not the time when the Act came into force to raise such objection; the proper time was after the election had been held. They should then demand a scrutiny of the votes, and if possible have the act set aside. He contended that the objection raised by the defence would amount to nothing. Even if all the votes polled by electors from the royalty were cancelled, there would still be a large majority in favor of the Act in the city. He had no doubt as to the Act being in full force in the city, but had grave doubts as to its being in force in the royalty. Mr. Davies pursued a very different line of argument to that of Mr. Hodgson. He argued that the election for the adoption of the Act was illegal from the fact that the returning officer had used an illegal list of voters and recorded votes in favor of the Act which were not qualified. Mr. Davies raised the same objections to the legality of the Canada Temperance Act as those raised during the trial of the test case in Fredericton, New Brunswick. The Magistrate reserved his decision and the court adjourned at noon.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Aug. 5.

The Land Bill was resumed in the Lords to-day and the clauses up to 11 have been adopted. The bill was passed through committee, after various important amendments had been adopted, the committee reported and the third reading of the bill has been fixed for Monday.

All the clauses up to 57 inclusive, were disposed of and the bill passed through committee.

LONDON, Aug. 5.

It is stated that a deputation of prominent Conservatives will go to Ireland to inquire into and report upon the relative condition of the laborers living respectively under, and working for, resident and non-resident landlords and farmers. The object is to form a basis, by its report, for legislation upon the labor question.

LONDON, Aug. 5.

The Daily News says in view of the avowed determination of the few Parnellites to obstruct the business of the Commons, the view of the Opposition has been ascertained in regard to an urgency for supply. The result of inquiry encourages the Government to believe that if this step is necessary the Opposition will cordially act.

LONDON, Aug. 5.

The following official changes in the Cabinet are announced: Lord Roseberry has been appointed Under Secretary for the Home Office, vice Courtney, who has been appointed Under Secretary for the Colonies, vice Rt. Hon. M. E. Grant Duff, who has been appointed Governor of Madras.

The Times Cork despatch says: The laborers' strike is everywhere extending. At Queenstown, Malloy, and at different centres of labor, men have joined the movement. The strike has merged into a general agitation for wages. The employers, with a few exceptions, are resisting the demands.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 5.

The Russian court made a recent journey to Moscow because of the discovery of an extensive conspiracy to assassinate the Imperial family. Sixty persons, some of them of high rank, are involved in the plot.

UNITED STATES.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5.

A despatch from Grass Valley says the First Artillery Battalion, N. G. C., in camp there, had a sham battle. In the bayonet charge to a fort the militia became excited, and before the struggle was over several commissioned officers and between twenty and thirty men were more or less wounded by bayonets, powder and butts of guns, none seriously, however.

BRADFORD, Pa., Aug. 4.

Last evening fourteen laborers coming down the grade of the Orleans, Bradford & Warren R. R. on a repairman's truck at high speed, ran into the Bradford express at the Erie Railway crossing. Barney Gilloo was killed, August Selgren had his shoulder and collar bone broken; the others were bruised and injured, but none fatally.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.

Secretary Hunt to-day issued an order directing Admiral Porter to take command of the naval vessels which will assemble at Yorktown.

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.

It is stated that leading Irishmen are holding secret meetings here. They are not allowing reporters to be present and are refusing any information as to their objects.

The secret convulse of Irishmen continued in session to-day and additional facts have leaked out concerning its objects. There are present John Warren, of Lowell, Mass., friend of Ben Butler; Thos. C. Quinn, of Peoria; Geo. J. West, Providence, a lawyer, and secretary of one branch of the Land League; Rev. Fr. Geo. C. Beals, St. Louis; Geo. C. Cunningham, New Haven; and many other well known agitators. It transpires that these men are the "dynamite crowd," that their deliberations are not as to whether dynamite shall be used against England, but as to the most feasible way of using it.
