Herford Breed Gaining In Popularity, Ass'n Is Told

Herford cattle are beating other beef breeds in popularity all over the world, National Director E. H. Himmelman, La-Have, N.S. told the Maritime Herford Breeders Association here yesterday and National Secretary Charles Leech, Calgary, Alta., said 530 Herfords were purchased this year by Ruro because they are the only breed that can stand the cold of St. Lawrence.

The versatility of the White Face in adapting themselves to temperate extremes is shown by the fact that an order of 50 breeding cattle went to Mexico, the national secretary observed.

The occasion was the annual field day, farm tour and annual meeting with President Edwin MacRae, Highfield presiding. The group enjoyed a lobster lunch at Birch Court at noon, served by the North River Women's Institute, and last night enjoyed a tasty dinner at Stanhope Beach Inn.

The Island and visiting Herford breeders and families visited the farms of Lewis and William Hayden, Cherry Valley; John MacKinnon and Lloyd Robb, Ussig; Jack MacKinnon, Brooklyn and A. S. MacSwin and Son, Morell yesterday afternoon.

They also stopped for a look at the Brown Swiss herd on a Black River Farm at Covehead. The field day part of the tour concludes at noon today with chicken barbeque at Mr. MacRae's farm, which follows a tour of Central Creameries plant here this morning.

Mr. Himmelman explained that the other beef breeders will have to agree to hold their meetings in the same centre, because the beef breeds hold one joint meeting each year at annual meeting time.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says seas were mostly by clear in the district late Friday evening after a day which saw much cooler air push into the Maritimes. However, very warm air lingered long enough at Yarmouth to set a new record maximum temperature for June 28. A reading of 82 degrees broke the old record of 74 set in 1929 and tied in 1937 and 1946.

A weak high pressure area lay across the district and will give a sunny day to all sections tomorrow.

Present indications are that Sunday will also be sunny. But warmer.

Heavy Storm Forces Longliners To Return

ALBERTON — Within hours after reporting their difficulties to the Radio Qalilagook the Nassiq in tow despite winds up to 80 miles per hour. At daybreak they were joined by Philip Kitch Kidlare Point captained by Cyrus Bernard.

A Search and Rescue plane from Halifax guided the Kidlare Point to the location about 20 miles north of North Cape.

The tow to Alberton was completed yesterday afternoon and the two boats are not expected to leave until next week. The motor failure was reported caused from water reaching the engine room through the air cowls.

The 46-foot Qalilagook is captained by Ches Russell, department of northern affairs with Eskimo David Pingardyak as engineer and Singituk, a veteran Eskimo boatman as deck hand.

The Nassiq is commanded by Don Milligan of the department of northern affairs and the engineer is Eskimo Adam Adami.

Sentencing Deferred In Theft Case

SUMMERSIDE — Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C. yesterday deferred the sentencing of Joseph David L. Gallant, 17, Summerside, until Oct. 8.

In sentencing the conduct of the accused, who earlier pleaded guilty to the theft of a jacket, the property of David Horton, Halifax, will be under close scrutiny.

Sgt. Harry MacKay told the court at Wednesday's session that Mr. Horton was a visitor to Summerside and his car ran out of gas on the Green Road on the afternoon of June 20th. While he was away getting gas several items were stolen from the vehicle.

Sgt. MacKay said this morning he had recovered all the items but it was not disclosed if any other charges are pending.
