

Vacation Schools Said Successful

The very successful vacation schools of Alberton pastoral charge of the United Church of Canada came to a conclusion on Friday. An eight-day school for Alberton and Casumpeck congregations was held in Alberton and a five-day school was held in Tignish.

The success of these schools is due to the careful preparation begun many weeks ago by the minister, Rev. J. M. Sproule, and his student - assistant, William Bowering, and to the competent assistance of two United Church caravanners, Miss Lois Goodwin and Miss Margaret Cooke, who had received training for this work at the Atlantic Christian Training Centre in Tatamagouche, N. The theme of the vacation school was, "We would see Jesus." In each class an outline study of the life of Jesus from His birth to His resurrection was made. Handwork, hymns and songs were co-ordinated with this study. In addition to these activities there was a daily period of recreation and, on the closing day, there was a picnic at each centre.

Each centre also had its public closing, with the children taking part and there was opportunity afterwards for parents and friends to view the handwork that had been done. Certificates were presented to all boys and girls who had been in attendance.

Miss Betty Mallett, Summerside was crowned Queen of Summerside's 3rd Annual Lobster Carnival at ceremonies conducted Saturday afternoon at Civic Stadium presided over by chairman of the Sea Queen Contest, Robert Hogg.

Miss Mallett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Mallett, was crowned by last year's queen, Miss June Ford. The princesses were Claudia Cameron and Elizabeth Thompson.

The ceremony was held at 4:40 p.m. to coincide with a nation wide C.B.C. broadcast which was to originate from the scene, however the broadcast had to be postponed until Monday evening due to earlier commitments on the network. A recording was made of the ceremony, by Jack MacAndrew of the C.B.C. outside broadcasts department.

On Saturday morning an impressive scene was witnessed by many from Marine Wharf as seven large power boats from the Sheediac Yacht Club entered the harbour line astern and tied up at the wharf. The flotilla was commanded by Commodore W.H. Colpitts and the official party included Mayor W.A. Currie and several councillors were present to greet the visitors.

the Summerside Fire Department. However the card was run off Thursday night with a 9-dash card Friday night.
