

# Large Crowd Attend Good Racing Meet At Summerside

For the first time in almost five years, a major league game was forfeited Sunday when the Philadelphia Phillies were awarded the second game of a doubleheader with St. Louis by a mandatory 9-0 score because the umpires became incensed at the stalling tactics of the Cardinals.

Only a few minutes earlier, the field was a mass of swinging, punching, wrestling players who participated in one of the biggest brawls since the days of the old St. Louis Browns.

The free-for-all was touched off by catcher Sal Yvars of the Cards and first baseman Earl Torgeson of the Phills and before peace was restored rival managers Terry Moore of Philadelphia and Eddie Stanky of St. Louis had tangled.

The last time major league game was forfeited was on Aug. 21, 1949, when New York was awarded a decision over Philadelphia in the second game of a doubleheader after Philadelphia had streamed onto the field.

# Fletcher Wins Canadian Open Golf Championship
