Flyers Edge Dodgers 1-0 In Thrilling Ball Game

Fiddler MacDonald's Flyers pushed across a run in the seventh inning and made it stand up to eke out a 1-0 victory over the Dodgers in regular city league game at Memorial Field last night.

Jimmy Fardy scored the only run when he got a life on an out-field error, advanced to third on Pineau's single and scored after he evaded a rundown when he was trapped between Kennedy and Leclair.

Williams Leads Red Sox To Victory Over Athletics With Homer And Two Doubles

(By the Canadian Press) Ted Williams, who has revitalized the Boston Red Sox since his return to the lineup, continued to swing for the fences Wednesday as the Sox exploded for a 12-4 victory over the Kansas City Athletics.

Williams hit his fifth homer in twelve games and doubled twice to drive in three runs in the one sided contest.

The slugger pushed his American League batting average from .341 to .378 before retiring in favor of Gene Stephens after his seventh inning bases-empty homer into the right field pavilion.

In the only other afternoon action the New York Giants took a 5-0 shutout victory over the Chicago Cubs in the National League.

Gail Harris, rookie first baseman called up from the minors to add some punch to the New York attack, came through with his fourth homer in five games to help Ruben Gomez to his third win against three defeats.

In night games Brooklyn was at Cincinnati, Philadelphia at Milwaukee and Pittsburgh at St. Louis in the National League. American League games saw Cleveland at Washington for two in a twilighter, Chicago at Baltimore and Detroit at New York.

Since the return of Williams to active duty the Sox have now won six of their last seven games. Winning pitcher was Frank Sullivan who gave up all four Athletic runs on two-run homers by Vic Power and Bill Wilson.

Norm Zauchin, a rookie trying to tie down the first baseman's job in the absence of Harry Agganis who is ill, contributed a three-run homer and drove in four of Boston's eight runs in the third inning. Besides his homer he walked the second time up with the bases loaded for his fourth RBI.

Jim Piersall also contributed a homer to the Sox 12-hit attack.

New York's first shutout of the season reduced the Cubs margin over the third-place Giants to 2 1/2 games. Willie Mays hit his 17th homer of the season as both Giant homers came in a three-run second inning against loser Sam (No Hit) Jones, whose record is now six wins against eight losses.

Gomez scattered eight hits for his victory.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The Pittsburgh Pirates exploded for eight runs in the fourth inning Tuesday night and went on to defeat the St. Louis Cardinals 10-5. As Dale Long drove in four runs and Bob Purkey turned in a clutch relief job in the seventh.

Long, who has climbed up among the league's leading hitters, hit his fifth homer of the season with the bases empty in the second and then batted home three runs in the decisive fourth with a double and bases-loaded single.

Thirteen men went to the plate for the Pirates against starter Larry Jackson and Brooks Lawrence in the fourth as they collected six hits, three intentional walks and one hit batsman.

Wally Moon hit a pair of two-run homers for the Cards in the fifth and ninth innings.

Ronnie Kline got credit for his fourth win against eight defeats while Jackson was charged with his fourth loss against two wins.

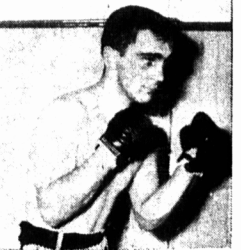
"But anybody who says I singled out any players with a charge of lazy ball is a liar," said Durocher just before the Giants whipped the Cubs 5-0.

Centennial Track-Field Meet Planned June 30th

The Centennial Interscholastic Track and Field Championships will be held at Memorial Field on Thursday June 30th.

To compete in the events of this meet, competitors must be entered by schools and no entry will be accepted if the boy or girl is not in regular attendance at school or has reached his or her seventeenth birthday on the first of September, 1954.

There will be two types of competitions; age and open events for girls and boys. Each school is limited to two entries in each event and contestants can compete only in their own age race or open events.

The Physical Fitness Division will be unable to bear the expense of transportation to the meet because of the expenses undertaken for the purchase of equipment and awards and teachers and principals of schools are asked to have their entries in before the closing date of midnight on June 28th.

There will be an award for each event and ribbons will be given for second and third places. The meet will consist of 50, 75 and 100 yard dashes for girls and boys in various age groups and a number of open events in which college students may take part.

Paliotti Wins Feather Title: TKO's Leroy Jones

HALIFAX (CP)—Gabby Paliotti of Montreal suggested his way to the Canadian featherweight boxing title here Tuesday night with a technical knockout over Leroy Jones of Halifax at the end of eight bawling rounds.

Paliotti dropped Jones to the deck for a nine-count in the seventh round and floored him again with an unmerciful right in the eighth before referee Jack Delaney stopped the battle.

The Halifax boxer was out on his feet at the end. His face was smeared with blood and he wandered aimlessly in the face of Paliotti's relentless attack.

The Montrealer weighed in at 124½; Jones, at 125½. Leroy was about two inches shorter than his opponent.

The fight had been billed for 12 rounds.

Paliotti and Jones slugged it out toe-to-toe for seven rounds but the Halifax boxer began to come apart at the seams after that. His stubborn refusal to quit drew a storm of applause from the 3,500 Halifax Forum fight fans.

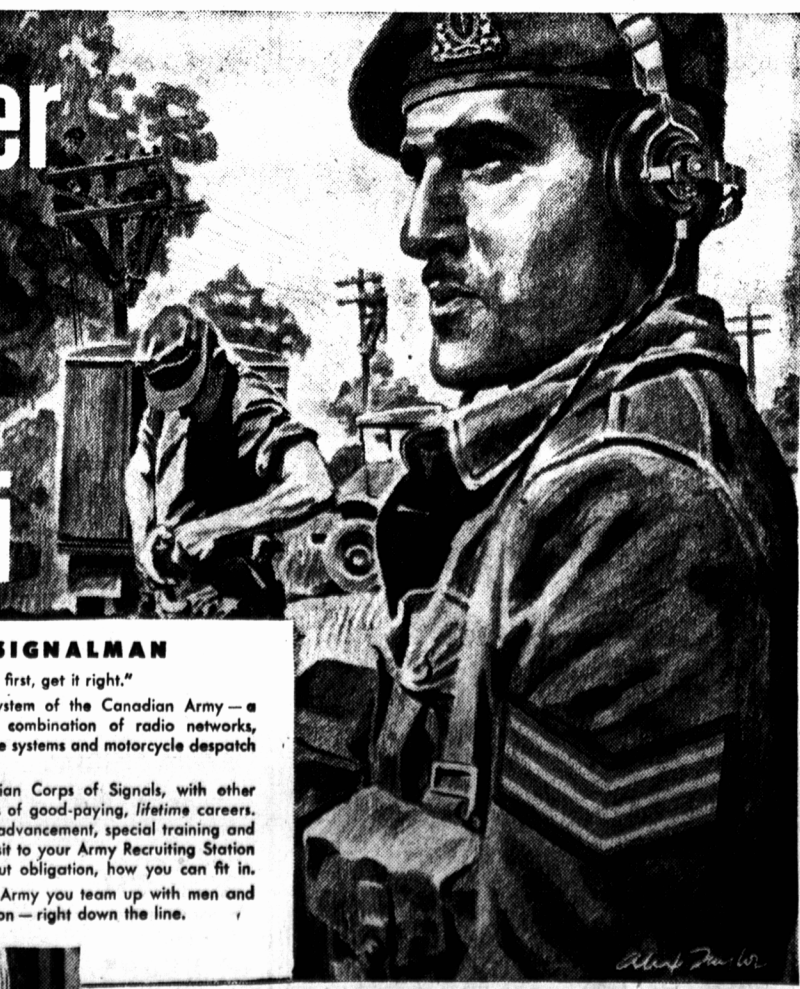
Delaney called a halt at 1:28 of the eighth round, only moments after Jones thudded to the canvas for the second time.

The Paliotti-Jones battle was the feature of a boxing card that saw Jack Hayden of Westville, N.S. win the vacant Maritime lightweight title in a split decision over Montreal's Dexter Connors.

The Pictou county boxer weighed 134½; Connors, 132.

They met for the crown relinquished by Halifax's Richard (Kid) Howard when he won the Canadian lightweight crown.

There were no knockdowns.

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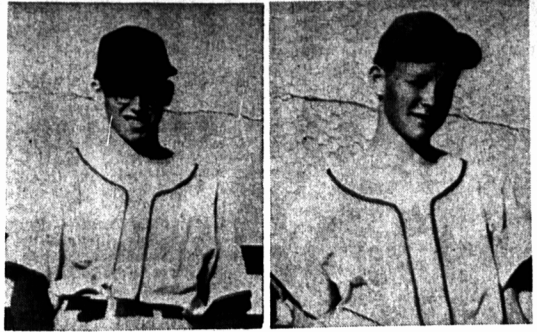
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In This Corner
