

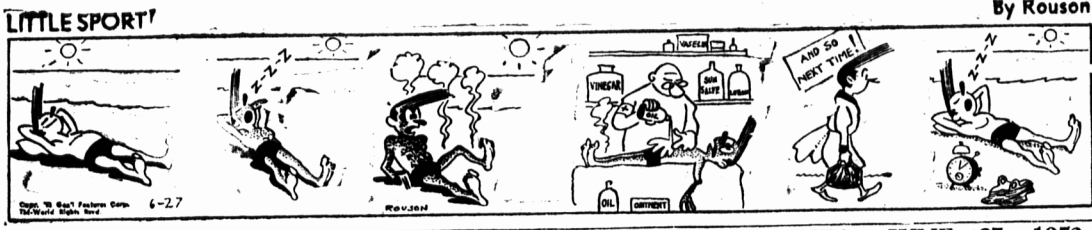


Dr. J. A. Donahoe of Truro, N.S. has quite a record as a picker of undeveloped speed that has made good. The pacer Doctor J. A. was bought as a 3-year-old and our readers will remember that he was sold for a big figure a few months ago to a patron of Del McTavish. He had taken a record of 2:09 4-5 last season as a 4-year-old. A few days ago he sold the pacer Bellini Might, a 6-year-old by Abner T. Clegg, to John Gamble, Truro. The night previously, June 19, Bellini Might won in 2:17 3-5—a new record. He also won again the same night in 2:18 4-5. The latter part of this week the Doctor bought the trotter April Bud 2:16 1-5, owned by the writer, on the recommendation of Rolfe Wood who has supplied him with several horses that have made good. April Bud has shown much faster than his record and we hope that in the Doctor's ownership he will reduce his mark considerably.

On the night of June 20 at Truro the 3-year-old pacer Pepper Shaker by Pepper by Volante, owned by Laurence Morris, Halifax, and driven by Connors, won the 2nd race in 2:21. Pepper's dam was Grateful Spirit by San Francisco 2:07 3-4 and his second dam Great Spirit 2:11 3-4 by Prodigal. She was a well liked brood mare at Walnut Hill Farm where Pepper was bred. Several other Peppers showed up well last year. He is owned by George S. Turner, Dartmouth, N.S. in the 3rd race the 4-year-old Lahey's Dream, that took a 3-year-old record of 2:15 3-5 paced a wonderful mile, the first quarter in 21 2-5, the half in 1:05 3-5, three-quarters in 1:39 and the mile in 2:13 3-5—the fastest mile of the night. He is by Jolly 2:05 1-4 and is owned by C. W. MacKenzie, Truro, and was driven by him. Stories of his speed as a 3-year-old floated around last year and now with such a start we expect the Dream horse to go in 2:10. Second to him in the 3rd race was the trotter Lusty's Queen by Lusty Frisco, owned by Kaiser & Nicholson of Halifax, and driven by Lloyd Walker. She has developed into a very good trotter since leaving our Province. Lahey's Dream was second in the 7th race which was won by Shelby Vic 2:10 7-5, a 4-year-old gelding by Victorious Hal, that owner-driver H. M. Sweeney bought at Harrisburg last fall. Junior Hal 2:10, now 12-year-old that has been on the go for quite a number of years, showed enough to win the 1st and 4th races for owner Ed Whalen of Amherst and driver Clayton MacLeod. Best time 2:16 3-5.

Our friend Stewart MacNeill, New York City, has kindly remembered us with notes on recent racing at Roosevelt Raceway, and also enclosed a program of Friday night, June 19, at the free-for-all races at Roosevelt on Friday, June 19, and Saturday, June 20, were terrific speed contests in which some of the fastest horses in training today faced the starter. In that time he has pitched only limited batting practice. Randy once pitched with Buffalo in the International League. It was back in 1946 and Edwards was a promising teen-aged left-hander who might have made the grade to the majors had he not injured his arm one night playing against Montreal Royals. He fielded a bunt down along the third base line that night and slipped while making the throw to first base. He injured a nerve in his arm and was forced to retire from the game. He never regained his pitching form and the next year retired from pro ball to enter college. Last year Randy served with U. S. Marine Corps and seldom ever touched a baseball. He was scheduled for a Korea draft on July 15 but he suffered a severe foot injury and was later discharged.

### HUNTERS' CORNER

Black ducks hatched exceptionally early this spring for some broods are able to fly and others are hard to distinguish from their mother as they flap through the rushes. There are others on the other hand that are just beginning to lose their baby colours and are developing into drab greyish-black ducklings that blend perfectly with the dead flags and sedge grass that is being replaced with summer greenery. Beaver dams are fruitful spots for young ducks and many broods are reared each season in such surroundings. They are out-of-the-way sheltered spots covered with flags, bull rushes, matted alder tangles, fallen trees, etc., that afford shelter from cold winds and protection from their natural enemies. The waters of a beaver dam team with all sorts of bugs and insect larvae and young ducks grow like weeds.
