

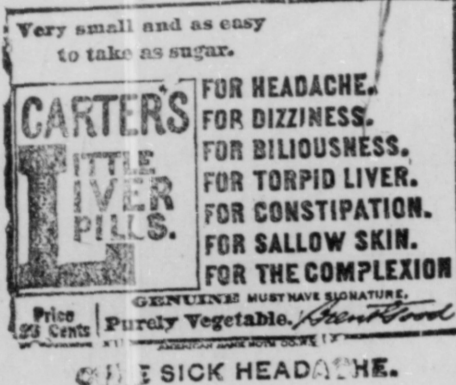

Kings County, N. B.

(St. John Globe, Liberals)

The election in the county of Kings on Thursday to fill the vacancy in the local representation caused by Mr. Pugsley's acceptance of the office of Attorney General resulted in the re-election of Mr. Pugsley. The local government party went into the contest to win, as defeat would have been disastrous and would have been condemnation not only of the new Attorney General, but of the administration which has been called into existence by Mr. Tweedie on Mr. Emmerous's re-election. All of the machinery necessary at elections was, therefore, put in operation, and the Government party moved upon the field as terrible as an army with banners. The Conservative party, on the other hand, ran away before the contest began at all. Although that party declared by formal resolution at a party convention that local and Dominion politics should be carried on by the party as organized for the Dominion, yet they did not put a candidate in the field, and left the new Attorney General to go unchallenged. Possibly the party managers may have thought this the wiser course in view of the approaching Dominion election, but Mr. Hezer, the local opposition leader seems to have made a mistake in tactics in not putting up an open fight at the polls when there was opportunity for it. Mr. Sproul, who ran on his own account and who was not an acceptable candidate to the whole body of the opponents to the Local Government, got a large vote, considering the difficulties under which he labored for want of all election appliances. After all, he was not left alone in his fighting. Although the party as a body did not endorse him, the Conservative workers in the county were out at the polls in his behalf, and he had some of the most active men engaged for him. Perhaps they were seeking to be in practice for the Dominion election. But they might just as well have been in the battle as a regular party.

The total vote polled was considerably less than at the general election, when there were six candidates in the field, three representing each side. On that occasion Mr. Scovil left the poll with 2,548 votes and Mr. Pugsley had 2,398, while Major Campbell, who led on the opposition side, had 2,239.

The Farmers Boys.

SIR LOUIS DAVIES AS AN ADMINISTRATOR.

An extraordinary revelation is made in the letter of Mr. S. Schofield. It only amounts to this, that Sir Louis Davies, as Minister of Marine, gets legislation through the house abolishing the winter deckload limit for steamships during a certain period. He did not know that he had done it, and his officers went on enforcing the old regulations. In this port alone a great number of ships were prevented by Sir Louis Davies' officers from taking the cargoes which Sir Louis Davies had by his own legislation authorized them to carry. It is shown that in one ship alone this illegal restriction cost the owners the sum of \$3,500 in freight. The total loss in freight last winter at this port alone would apparently be \$25,000 to \$50,000. The same unlawful restrictions were enforced in other ports. Mr. Schofield suggests that the shipowners have a claim for indemnity for their loss. While it might be a dangerous precedent for the government to begin paying those who lose by the blunders, the carelessness, and the superficiality of Sir Louis Davies, it is a fact that in the last few months many claims have been made which had a much worse basis than this would be.—St. John Sun.

—An eminent French statistician writing recently in Petit Journal, of Paris, estimated that Russia will double her population in forty-five years, Austria Hungary in seventy years, England in eighty years and Italy in one hundred and ten years, while France at her present rate of increase will require eight hundred and sixty years! The United States is just about doubled in population in the last thirty years.
