THE body of Mr. Norman McLeod, of Uigg, who was accidentally killed near Bangor, Me., on Sunday last, arrived in the Steamer "St. Lawrence." The body of F. D. Martin, of Belfast, who died at Acadia College, Wolfville N. S., arrived by the same Steamer.

THE examination of Michael Began charged with breaking into Messrs. J. & T. Morris' warehouse, on Water street on Tuesday, the 16th inst., and stealing two cases of whisky therefrom, was concluded yesterday and the prisoner was remanded for trial in the Supreme Court. His companion in the robbery Thomas Petrovich, is still at large. The evidence against both is very strong.
Two boys, named Cassidy alias Higgins and Joseph McLellan, were on Tuesday committed to Prince County Jail, charged with breaking into the Railway Station at Alberton, and stealing liquor; and two boys of a larger growth were also committed on a charge of receiving the stolen goods. Hon. Neil McLeod, who was employed in investigating the case, returned to town last evening.
THE St. Lawrence encountered very stormy weather on her trip to Pictou yesterday. Off Point Prim she was struck by a heavy sea, and the mainmast was carried off. On nearing Pictou she fell in with the schooner Charles in distress, and towed her into port. The steamer returned to this port to-day with a large freight, mails and passengers, arriving at 10 30 a. m.
