SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

Differing Reports Boers Active.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER)

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The South Africa situation is improving and Lord Roberts will shortly return to England with the majority of his staff.

Arrangements are being made at Capetown to send the first batch of refugees back to Johannesburg.

Nevertheless the activity of the Boers continues. On the 28th, a commando of three hundred captured a garrison of thirty men at Reddersburg but released them.

Trains from the south to Pretoria are attacked almost daily.

On October 24th the burghers occupied Kellyfontein.

On the other hand, Kirds has inflicted a reverse on DeWet's force near Pares,—capturing two guns, one of them lost by the British in Sannas post.

The Daily Express publishes sensational statements that Boer revival is more serious than they had been led to believe, and in consequence Lord Roberts' return is likely to be still further postponed. It also says that no considerable party of troops will return before February, and that five thousand horses will be sent out.

It declares that Boers are well armed, abundantly supplied with ammunition and that the campaign likely will last another six months.

In the best informed quarters it is reported that there is no ground for the pessimism of The Express.

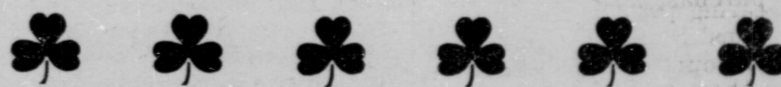
