R.C.A.F. To Escort Princess

HALIFAX (CP)—The air force said it will provide an escort of Lancasters for the plane carrying Princess Margaret home to London from her Caribbean tour March 2.

Three Lancasters will fly out of Gander, Nfld., and two from Greenwood, N. S., to be with the royal airliner from a point off New York to mid-Atlantic.

The royal airliner will return via Gander. On the crossing from London the plane was to have landed at Gander but was diverted to Montreal.

In Memoriam

The death of John Martin Ladner in his 70th year occurred at his residence at 40 Hillsboro Street, Charlottetown, Sunday morning, January 9th. The late Mr. Ladner suffered for the past few years with a serious heart ailment, which caused his sudden passing.

Mr. Ladner was born at Bangor, P.E.I., the son of the late John Ladner and Margaret Henderson. N. S. House Opens Road Accidents Featured

HALIFAX (CP)—A royal commission to study "the whole matter" of automobile insurance and new measures designed to curb the number of highway accidents were forecast in the speech from the throne as the Nova Scotia legislature opened Wednesday.

The predictions appeared in consecutive items in the speech read by Lieutenant-Governor Alstair Fraser and recalled a statement by Premier Hicks a few days ago that insurance rates, whether handled by private firms or a government agency, would have to be based on accident figures.

The speech said the royal commission probe would cover "the cost of obtaining adequate insurance protection." Several delegations recently have asked the government to take over operation of an insurance scheme similar to that now used in Saskatchewan in an effort to lower rates.

Premier Hicks is heading the Liberal government for the first time since he took over the party leadership following the death of the late premier Angus L. Macdonald. The Progressive Conservative Opposition, under Robert L. Stanfield, has been strengthened by a by-election victory. The standing is Liberals 21, Progressive Conservatives 13, CCF two and vacant, one.

The throne speech, longer than usual and revealing general trends

and making predictions of planned legislation, said the government "views with concern the increasing number of highway accidents and fatalities."

It said that improved measures for the examination or re-examination of motor vehicle operators would be inaugurated. This would be the first time that re-examination of drivers has been instituted in Nova Scotia. The time period was mentioned but some sources predicted that drivers would be required to undergo driving tests every 10 years.

PROBE METAL RESOURCES

The speech also forecast:
1. Study of a possible redistribution of seats in the House.
2. Completion of a forestry inventory of Cape Breton before the end of the current fiscal year.
3. Continued investigation of copper and other base metal deposits in the province.
4. Increased tourist and industrial development activity.
5. Opening of the Canso causeway "during the present year," the Halifax-Dartmouth bridge before the session ends, and the Yarmouth-Bar Harbor Marine ferry "during the coming summer."
6. Increased attention to improvement and surfacing of secondary roads now that reconstruction and paving of main trunk highways is nearing completion.

Measure into a small bowl
1 cup lukewarm water
3 teaspoons granulated sugar
and stir until sugar is dissolved.

Beat together slightly with a fork and hold to finish fancy doughs,
1 egg white
1 tablespoon cold water

Turn out dough on lightly-floured board. Divide into 4 equal portions and finish as follows:

1. Apricot Turnovers. Roll out dough to 8 x 12 inches. Cut into 12 squares; moisten edges. Put spoonful of apricot jam on each square; fold into turnovers; seal; slip tops. Place on greased cookie sheet. Cover. Let rise in warm place 15 mins. Brush with egg-white mixture; sprinkle with chopped almonds and sugar. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 20 mins.

2. Raisin Rounds. Cream 3 tbsps. butter; mix in ¼ cup brown sugar, 1 tsp. flour, 1 tsp. grated lemon rind and ½ cup raisins. Roll out dough to ¼-inch thickness; cut into 2½-inch rounds of 12. Moisten edges of half the rounds with water; place spoonful of raisin mixture on each one; cover with remaining rounds; seal; cut 2 in top of each round. Place on greased cookie sheet. Cover. Let rise in warm place 15 minutes. Brush with egg-white mixture; sprinkle with sugar. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 18 to 20 mins. Frost while hot, if desired.

3. Van Strips. Roll out dough to 8 x 18 inches. Run strip of 2 tbsps. thick jam down each side, 1 inch in from edge. Moisten edges and fold over jam to meet in centre; seal. Place on greased cookie sheet. Cover. Let rise in warm place 15 mins. Brush with egg-white mixture; sprinkle with sliced almonds and sugar. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 25 to 30 mins. While hot, spoon thick lemon filling down centre. Drizzle with frosting.

4. Cinnamon Braid. Combine ¼ cup sugar and ½ tsp. cinnamon; sprinkle all but 2 teaspoonsful on baking board; place dough on board; roll out to 9 x 14 inches; fold dough over twice. Repeat rolling and folding twice. Roll out dough to 4 x 18 inches; cut into 3 long strips, joined at one end; braid. Place on greased cookie sheet. Cover. Let rise in warm place 15 mins. Brush with egg-white mixture; sprinkle with 2 tbsps. chopped almonds and ¼ tsp. sugar mixture. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 30 mins. Spread hot bread with frosting.

CONSERVATION'S FROSTING: Combine 1¼ cup milk, 1 cup sugar, ¼ cup tbsps. milk and ¼ tsp. vanilla.

Widow Of Former French Diplomat Dies

NEW YORK (AP)—Lady Mary Greaves, 34-year-old daughter of a British countess, died under puzzling circumstances in her luxurious Central Park West apartment early today.

On a dresser at her bedside police found several bottles of barbiturates, including two thought to be sleeping pills.

At first, officers termed her death apparent suicide. Later, however, they withdrew this description and blamed "an apparent overdose of sleeping pills."

Finally, the whole question was left open and an autopsy ordered in an effort to make an exact determination.
