The Debate on the Address Continued.

THE GOVERNMENT FIND A NEW APOLOGIST.

Other Notes -- ex-Speaker Peter White Nominated.

OTTAWA, April 7.—The debate on the address is still continued.

Leighton McCarthy said he stood on the question of tariff and school legislation, on the platform of his late uncle.

Robertson, of Toronto, in a brief but trenchant speech, condemned the Yukon government and expressed the opinion that Sifton could not have been in the midst of these things so long without knowing something of it.

Rev. Mr. Maxwell had the floor after recess. His speech so far as it related to the Yukon, was of the nature of a plea for mercy to offenders. He quoted the example of the Master of us all in respect to the woman taken in adultery and also the language of Burns, that to step aside is human. In the course of his remarks Mr. Maxwell made a sneering reference to the Senate for which the speaker called him to order.

Replying to Sir Wilfred Laurier, Sir Charles Tupper said that many opposition members still desire to speak on the address and he feared that the debate would not close this week.

Ex-Speaker Peter White was unanimously chosen by the Liberal Conservatives of Brockville, as a candidate for the seat made vacant by the death of Hon. J. F. Wood.

The Government candidate is a wealthy man and every effort will be made to elect him; but the opposition has good hope of the election of its former speaker, whose return would restore to public life one of the ablest and most reputable members of the former parliament.

Montreal Star: The Liberal Parliamentary party has removed the name of Mr. R. I. Richardson, M. P., from its list of "whips." Nothing could be more appropriate. Mr. Richardson has been showing very plainly of late that he does not know a whip when he feels one. For a long time now, Richardson, of Lisgar, has respectfully declined to pipe for the dancing of Sifton; and to interfere with the dancing lessons of the Minister of the Interior is a capital offence. Men who were sent up to take even the most responsible posts had no experience of the duties they were to discharge. Their reputations had been made as sections of the Sifton machine in Manitoba, whose methods are more disreputable even than those of the Mowat-Hardy machine in Ontario. When they did things that provoked the angry criticism of all who heard of them, they were simply applying their election methods to public business. They are really not more to blame than the man who nominated and the man who appointed them. As Mr. Tarte says, a scallawag is a scallawag. He cannot be anything else.

To be Transferred to Command Mediterranean Fleet.

BRITISH SHIPPING STATISTICS.

The total addition of British steam tonnage during the year has been 1,111,768 tons gross; and of sailing tonnage, 29,053 tons gross; or in all 1,140,821 tons gross. So large an addition of steam tonnage has not been recorded in any previous year. About 90 per cent. of the tonnage added to the register consists of new vessels, not one of which has been built abroad. The largest items among the other additions to the register are those of vessels transferred from British colonies and from foreign countries to the United Kingdom. These together amount to 97,920 tons, or less than 9 per cent. of the total. The gross deduction of steam tonnage from the register amounts to 696,669 tons, and of sailing tonnage, to 274,868 tons, or, in all, to 971,537 tons. About 33 per cent. of the steam tonnage, and 32 per cent. of sailing tonnage, included in these figures, have been removed on account of loss, breaking up, dismantling, &c.

The tonnage transferred to foreigners during 1898 reaches the large total of 588,598 tons, exceeding the similar figures for 1895, 1896 and 1897 (themselves exceptionally high) by 229,371 tons, 249,233 tons and 200,714 tons, respectively. The steam tonnage which has been deducted on this account amounts to less than 44,725 tons and the sailing tonnage to 153,783 tons, or about 62 and 65 per cent., respectively, of the total deductions in each case. In the main, the vessels which are transferred to foreigners are not of very recent construction.
