

Sweede Scores Stunning Upset; Patterson Chilled In 3rd Round

NEW YORK (AP) — Sweden's Ingemar Johansson uncovered the mystery right hand he hid in training and won the world heavyweight boxing championship Friday night by flooring Floyd Patterson seven times and stopping the defending king in 2:03 of the third round.

It was the most dramatic and shocking upset since Schmeling flattened Joe Louis in 1936.

Written off as a poor 5-1 underdog, the unbeaten modern day

Viking from Goteborg became the first non-American born heavy champion since Primo Carnera in 1933-34.

CINDERELLA STORY
Ingemar, the flop of the 1952 Olympics when he was disqualified for not fighting in the final bout with America's Ed Sanders, thus completed one of the greatest Cinderella stories in the annals of the ring by beating the man who was the hero of the same Helsinki Olympics.

Seven times the gory Patterson was sent reeling to the canvas

with blood streaming from his face. He never seemed to know what hit him after the first right hand bumped him on his back for nine. He barely beat the count and walked off toward Johansson's corner, starting off into space, while Johansson clubbed him with another right hand.

Down for counts of nine, nine, six, six, six and nine, the completely stunned and bewildered young New Yorker was saved from complete destruction by referee Ruby Goldstein.

SEVENTH KNOCKDOWN
When Patterson went down for the seventh time, the count had reached only one when the referee stopped the complete slaughter.

Johansson, winner of all his 21 previous fights, 13 by knockouts, took charge in the first round with his left jab. It was just like the training camp at Grossinger, N.Y. all over again. All left. No right.

Suddenly late in the first he flashed one right that landed on top of the champ's head. This was the type of punch that claimed highly rated Eddie Machen as a first round knockout victim last September and won Ingemar the title shot.

In the second round, Patterson was beginning to come on, slamming to the body but without too much effectiveness. Ingemar's stinging jab still was keeping him off but the Swede's right still was missing fire.

THE MYSTERIOUS RIGHT
Patterson came out for the third, sticking with his left and looking over the top of the left as though sighting a gun. Boom came the "thunder and lightning"

right that the Swedes have been talking about and down went Patterson on his back.

Then Patterson took his eerie walk into never-never land with his hands dangling at his side, Johansson, sensing the big chance his fists already had given him, came dashing to the attack with another right.

After each of the first two knockdowns it looked as though the champ was not going to get up. But he kept on coming back gamely only to run into more of this right hand punch that no longer is a mystery.

DOWN AGAIN
A hard left and right sent the champ growling into the resin dust until Goldstein counted six. Another right sent him down on his back near the ropes. He pulled himself up to one knee, pawing weakly at the ropes to help himself get up at six.

Bleeding was streaming from Patterson's mouth and nose as he went sprawling from another right. This time it took seven seconds before he pulled himself together. A left-right combination made even the thickest skinned fans wonder how much longer they could let it go. Patterson took nine this time and got up once more.

The right hand did it once more. Goldstein declared the armistice.

The end of the bout touched off an explosive scene in the ring. Ingemar's trainers, American and Swedish, grabbed him in waltz step. Edwin Ahlqvist, the Swedish promoter who is Ingemar's "adviser," joined in the celebration along with Dr. Gosta Karlsson, his personal physician

from Sweden, and all the Swedes who could break through the heavy cordon of police.

MOB SCENE
For several frantic minutes, hundreds teetered on the edge of the ring apron, rebuffed by police, in a scene that recalled the turmoil in Philadelphia when Brockton, Mass. fans burst into the ring to cheer Rocky Marciano's knockout of Jersey Joe Walcott.

Johansson, who trained "family style" with his mother, father, sister, two brothers, and fiancée in attendance, was the fifth man born outside America to win the heavy crown. The others were Bob Fitzsimmons, Tommy Bruns, Max Schmeling and Primo Carnera.

Only three other men ever won the big prize of boxing without ever losing a fight. They were John L. Sullivan, Jim Jeffries and Rocky Marciano. Jeffries, however, had been held to two draws.

MAN AGAINST BOY?
Johansson, a strapping 196-pounder, towered over the 162-pound Patterson. It looked like a man against a boy, although the difference was only 14 pounds. At least, the difference was only 14 pounds Thursday when they weighed in before the postponement because of threatening weather.

Rain fell for 2½ hours Friday night, delaying the start of the program for an hour, and almost forcing promoter Bill Rosenzweig to postpone the show until Saturday or Monday.

The new champion is the first Swede ever to fight for a world title and, of course, the first from that Scandinavian land ever to win a world championship. His victory must have touched off the greatest celebration in his native Goteborg since Gustavus Adolphus founded that seaport city in 1619.

Patterson had lost only one fight in 36 previous starts as a professional since he returned from Helsinki as the Olympic middleweight champion. He lost a questionable decision to Joey Maxim in 1954 and had won 22 straight since. In five title bouts, counting the night he won the crown by stopping Archie Moore he had scored five knockouts.

CHINK IN THE ARMOR
The chink in Patterson's armor should have been clear to all after right hand punches by the likes of Pete Rademacher, an amateur, and Roy Harris had knocked him down. Johansson came with glowing press tributes about the power of his right and a lusty testimonial from Machen, a one-round victim last September. But he kept it under the smorgasbord in training.

No longer will anybody ever ask—where is the right hand? Despite the rain and the many harassments that have bothered Johansson, he managed to get the bout off before about 30,000 people paying a disappointing gate, estimated at \$450,000.

'Straight Right' Says Champion

NEW YORK (AP) — "I was surprised when he got up straightly when I hit a man like that he stays down."

Ingemar Johansson of Sweden, the new heavyweight champion of the world, brandished his explosive right fist proudly in the sweeter and confusion of Yankee Stadium's catacombs and told how he beat champion Floyd Patterson into submission in 2:03 of the third round Friday night.

"It was a straight right—and flush on the chin," the dimpled, smiling Viking added.

"It was my best shot, and I thought the fight was over there. But I had to hit him again and

again. Johansson threw his vaunted fist high in the air in a gesture of victory.

"You see I foot you," he told gathered newsmen in his dressing room. "You thought my right hand was just a fantasy. I show you—and I also show Patterson."

Rocky Marciano, former king of the heavyweights, now plump and jowly from too much rich Italian cooking, was one of the first to reach Johansson's side and shake his hands.

"It was fantastic," said the retired undefeated heavyweight champion. "I never saw anything like it—never in my life. It was so quick and so deadly."

'Didn't See It' Says Patterson

NEW YORK (AP)—Floyd Patterson, dethroned heavyweight champion of the world, leaned sadly against the wall of Mickey Mantle's dressing room and said:

"I couldn't see the punch coming.

"The first one hit flush on the forehead.

"When I got up the first time I didn't know where I was.

"I didn't feel the second punch but after that I think I started to come out of it.

"But I couldn't criticize the referee for stopping the fight."

Patterson whispered all this to his manager, Gus D'Amato, who in turn shouted it to the perspiring, milling crowd of newspapermen.

In the midst of the shouted interview, the new champion, Ingemar Johansson, came crowding in, a gentle grin on his face.

"Are you hurt, Floyd," he asked.

"No," was the reply.

D'Amato talked bravely of a return match. There is a contract calling for one in 90 days—although such contracts are often ignored in boxing.

"Patterson will be the first heavyweight champion in history to retain the title," said D'Amato.

THE FIGHT BY ROUNDS

ROUND ONE
Ingo jabbed lightly to Patterson's head. Ingo was short for four more jabs as Patterson moved cautiously. Patterson scored with a looping left hook and a left jab to the head. Ingo moved around Patterson working with his left jab. Patterson got in another stiff left jab. Ingo threw a hard right hand to the top of Patterson's head. He threw it fast but it did not have much effect on the champion. Johansson's round.

ROUND TWO
Ingo again moved in and landed a left jab. Floyd also got in his own left jab to the head. Ingo kept popping his left hand at the cautious champion. The Swede drove a hard short right to the side of Patterson's head but missed with a left hook. Patterson drove a left hook to Ingo's body. Ingo kept on the offensive with his left jabs.

ROUND THREE
Ingo started the third round with two left jabs to the head. A right hand sent Patterson on his back. He staggered to his feet at nine. A right hand dropped Patterson again for nine. Another right dropped Patterson for nine again. A light left hook sent Patterson to the floor for six. Johansson smashed the bleeding groggy champion with both hands. A left and right dropped Patterson again for seven. An other left and right dropped Patterson for nine. A left and right dropped Patterson again and referee Ruby Goldstein immediately stopped the fight. The time was 2:03.

Baseball Commissioner Backs Loop Expansion

NEW YORK (AP) — Baseball commissioner Ford Frick said Friday backers of a third major league may find out—once they get into the matter—that this is not the best way to meet the game's need for expansion.
"My personal attitude on the proposed third league has been distorted somewhat and I would like to make my position clear," the bushy-haired executive said in an interview in his mid-Manhattan tower.
"I am wholeheartedly for expansion, and I am for it the best way we can get it. If the third major league is the answer, then I will throw my full support behind it. But for years I have had other ideas about how we should go about this."
"I am in favor of adding teams gradually—first four teams, making 10 teams in each league and then a couple of years later four more teams to build two 12-club leagues."
RE-EXPLORE PICTURE
"Having reached that point, we then could sit down and re-explore the picture. That would be the time to decide on additional leagues."
Frick emphasized that he did not want to be put in the position of throwing cold water on the third league idea.

Baseball Commissioner Backs Loop Expansion

Preliminary plans for a third major league already are in the works. Bill Shea, chairman of Mayor Wagner's New York baseball committee, recently identified the persons behind the New York entry. Among other cities suggested for the new league are Toronto, St. Paul—Minneapolis, Houston, Buffalo and Dallas-Fort Worth.

Frick said the topic may be discussed at the joint meeting of the major leagues July 10 in Chicago—after the July 7 all-star game in Pittsburgh. Other topics to be discussed there are the minor league fund and the inter-league trading question.
