Geo'town, Cardigan Observe Remembrance Day, Monday

GEORGETOWN — Remembrance Day was observed in Georgetown with a series of darkened skies and drizzling rain. The parade under the direction of S. Hatcherford moved out from the legion home to the war memorial where the traditional ceremony was held.

O Canada was sung and the piper played "Flowers of the Forest" and two minutes silence was observed. The piper then played a march. The poem "They Shall Grow Old" was read by Michael Burke, legion branch president and then the list of veterans who died in both World Wars was read by Marcellus Gaters.

The prayer was delivered by Rev. L. B. Dooley. Wreaths were laid by Thomas Curran, M.L.A. for the provincial government; by Mayor A. H. Stewart for the Town of Georgetown; by branch president Burke for the Georgetown Branch, Royal Canadian Legion; for the Cardigan Branch; for the legion in Clonville; for the Legion Ladies auxiliary by Mrs. Warren Baker; for the Legion Auxiliary by Mrs. Currie.

Next in kind ceremonies were held at the veterans' home where Mr. Burke was the speaker. The guests were Andrew MacEachern, M.C., Canadian Legion welfare officer.

Other speakers were Mayor Stewart, Father Dooley, George Ferguson, M.L.A. and Thomas Curran, M.L.A. Louis Canello replied for the veterans.

The veterans, their guests and the general public were served a turkey or ham dinner in the town hall and later a smoker was held in the legion home.

Two Delegates Leave Today For Allied Youth Conference

Two provincial executive members of Allied Youth will represent this province at the annual Allied Youth Conference in Buck Hill Falls, Pennsylvania, from Nov. 15 to 17.

SUMMARY — MONTREAL (CP) — A firm tone characterized prices on the Montreal and Canadian exchange Monday. Trading was brisk.

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CURRENCIES — MONTREAL (CP) — The closing bid on the U.S. dollar in terms of Canadian funds was \$1.07 9/16, the asked \$1.07 1/2. The closing bid was \$1.07 21/32, the asked \$1.07 23/32.

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market bid on a surprisingly strong rally Monday in spite of semi-holiday conditions prevailing because of the Veterans Day observance.

Volume swelled to 5,600,000 shares from Friday's 4,300,000. As prices rose, stocks on a broad front.

Responsible for the rally were record auto sales and record retail volume in October, signs of increased demand for steel and an increase in weekly steel production and the failure of a line cancer suit to win damages from a major tobacco company.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 2.28 to 624.41, bringing that indicator back to levels preceding the May 28 Black Monday plunge.

The 10 stock price average of 60 stocks rose 2 1/2 to 220 1/2, the biggest rise since Oct. 29 when the average gained 3.7. An estimated \$4,000,000 was added to the quoted value of stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange, based on figures by the AP average.

BANKS CLOSED — Banks, insurance companies and other sources of investment demand were closed for the Veterans Day holiday.

Of 1,944 futures traded, 938 advanced and 17 declined. All but the 15 most active stocks advanced.

Brutuswick was the most active stock, up 1/4 to 186.20 on 3,400 shares. Second was Chrysler, up 1/4 to 65 1/2 on 27,400 shares.

U.S. steel was heavily traded, up 1/4 to 15 1/2. Youngstown Steel, 2 Jones and Laughlin 1/4.
