ANOTHER RACE.—There was a trotting race on Hillsborough ice on Wednesday afternoon between Fred. Bevan's mare, "Lady Finch," and James Sullivan's horse. "Lady Finch" won in straight heats. Fred. says he has lately refused a good offer for his mare, which is evidently moving well.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY.—The celebration of St. Patrick's Day, which takes place on Monday, the 17th inst., promises to surpass that of previous years. Every preparation is being made to add to its success. The Benevolent Irish Society, preceded by the military and St. Dunstan's College bands, will march in procession to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, where divine service will be held, and a sermon suitable for the occasion will be preached by the Rev. P. A. McElmeel. A concert will be held in the evening, for which a splendid programme has been prepared, which appears in another column.

A NEW DEPARTURE.—The Island Farmer says: The Summerside Presbyterian Church has taken a new departure this year. They have issued a pamphlet containing some 20 pages, which contains a report of the work of the congregation for the year 1889. From it we learn that the receipts from all sources for the past year were \$3,298.09, and the total expenditure, \$3,661.89, which leaves a deficit of \$363.80. This is the result, however, mainly of the large outlay upon the church edifice, incurred during the year. The pamphlet also contains an 'in memoriam' page upon which are the names of all those who died during the year.

ANOTHER FIRE.—We regret very much to learn that the large building on Holland Cove Farm, Rocky Point, used as a grainery, cow stable and implement house, was destroyed by fire last night, about eleven o'clock. All the cattle in that portion of the building used as a stable were released, with the exception of the pure-bred Jersey bull, "Benbow" and the pure-bred Berkshire sow "Lady Holland," with a three-weeks-old litter. These were cremated. All the farming implements, including a new Toronto Binder, were destroyed, as was also a large quantity of wheat and oats. The origin of the fire is a mystery. Were it not for the prompt assistance rendered by some of the neighbors who were early on the scene, the fire would likely have spread to the dwelling house and other buildings in the neighborhood. The building destroyed was insured in the Glasgow and London Insurance Company, represented by Mr. F. W. Hyndman, for \$500; and the ordinary contents of the building were also insured in the same company for \$500.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 13.

In answer to Cartwright Hon. Mr. Foster said the Banking Bill would probably be introduced on Tuesday next. He could not say when the Budget would be presented, but would give a week's notice as he promised.

On an amendment to the notice to go into supply, Hon. David Mills moved that in the public expenditure of public interest and not political favor should control, and in the choice of the place of erection of public buildings for post office, custom house and inland revenue purposes, regard should be had for the public interest and for the business done. He proceeded to criticise the manner in which the Government had distributed public patronage.

Sir John Macdonald defended the Government bill, and said he was quite in accord with the resolution and would vote for it.

The discussion on Mills' resolution was continued until 11 o'clock, when it was carried unanimously. The House then went into supply. A long discussion took place upon various items of Intercolonial Railway estimates. Capital expenditure items were passed and the House adjourned at 12.55 a. m.

In the Senate to-day Hon. Mr. Boulton's resolution proposing that the Dominion and the Provinces should be represented in the Imperial House of Commons by delegates appointed by the Dominion and Provincial Governments, was taken up.

Mr. Boulton made a long speech in favor of Imperial federation, and was supported by Hon. Messrs. Kaibach, Howland, Prowse, Haythorne and others.

Hon. Messrs. Scott and Power condemned the scheme as utopian, and deprecated wasting time over it instead of discussing practical urgent questions.

Hon. Mr. Abbott, Government Leader, urged Mr. Boulton to withdraw his resolution, as the scheme he proposed was impracticable. The British Commons would never admit to membership men appointed by colonial governments and not elected by the people. In conclusion, he condemned the imperial federation scheme as it stood at present. He was in favor of the abstract idea, but so far no feasible plan had been proposed, and until it were he could not support it.

The resolution was withdrawn.

A City Flooded.

NEW ORLEANS, March 13.

At 1 p. m. at Poydras Street, water commenced running over the levee, and all the low places in the vicinity were soon flooded. The streets about the Sugar Exchange are flooded. At 3.30 p. m., the gauge was sixteen feet, six inches, above high water mark in former years. A large part of the city below Canal Street is nearly submerged. The indications are that the entire business portion of the city will be covered with water before morning.

Honoring the Champion.

ST. JOHN, N. B., March 13.

Hugh J. McCormack was presented at Palace Rink to-night with a Swiss gold stop watch, chain and seal in honor of winning the championship of the world. He got a great reception.

FREDERICTON, March 13.

Judge Stedman has commenced libel proceedings against the St. John Sun for an editorial charging him with unfairness, etc. in making up the Queen's County election list.

Provincial Legislation.

The provincial legislature was opened this afternoon, with the usual military display.
