

Fast Action Seen Need By Canada's Dairymen

This week has seen two developments of more than ordinary interest and importance to dairymen. The first refers to stabilization policy for the dairy industry. Following the announcement of the government's stabilization policy, made in the form of sections of the dairy industry, and the second is the fact that the government has apparently decided to maintain the program essentially as it is last year, but with an important change.

The change in question does not affect the program, but it is of marked importance to the consumer of better milk which will benefit through a consumer subsidy of 12 cents.

The switch in policy is of course, important to the dairymen. As originally announced the fluid milk shippers would have 50 cents per hundred weight on their surplus milk, this is now changed and the change will enable plants which had been making cheese out of surplus fluid milk to continue in operation, otherwise the only outlet for such milk at a reasonable price would have been for evaporated.

Cheese will continue to operate under a 22 cent floor as was the case last year, there will be no reduction in the price of cheese to the consumer. Associated with all this is a firm reminder by the minister of agriculture that the dairy industry and specifically the Ontario and Quebec part of it have a year to get their act together in so far as marketing and control of production is concerned. The important question is of course, what the effect on consumption will be of the 12 cent reduction.

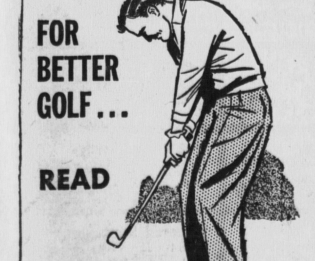
It can be assumed that unless consumption and production are brought into reasonable balance that whatever government is in power will be forced to take drastic action will not likely be delayed as the longer it is done the better the longer will be the period for the wounds to heal.

It does appear that this coming dairy year is a year of grace, and may represent only a stay of execution unless certain results are apparent and certain definite action taken by dairy people themselves.

CORN ASSISTANCE
The second announcement of importance is one to the effect that \$5. per ton assistance is to be paid on the movement of corn into the Maritime provinces. The question was initiated early in January by the Federation of Agriculture and was that the measure be applied to Ontario corn. While the press reports are not definite, we are assuming that the assistance will also apply on a temporary basis to American corn.

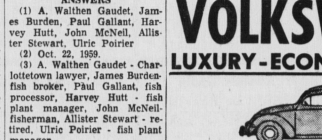
