Apparently the United States growers plan to increase their acreage by 6 percent, in spite of the fact that officials have warned that this will mean excess production of 35,000,000 to 40,000,000 bushels. If this increased production trend is continued the result will be disastrous for next year. It is still not too late for potato growers in the Northern States and Canada to become realistic and make a reasonable effort to keep this year's production in accord with market requirements.
