A FISHING schooner owned by W. Shawner, of Greave's Cove, and commanded by his brother, was wrecked in Trinity Bay, Nfld., on the 8th inst., and her entire crew of thirteen lost. There are no particulars, as no man was left to tell the tale.

THE schooner Fanny Fern, of Gloucester, was run down Saturday morning while coming home from the George's by an unknown outward bound coal steamer. She was cut in two and sunk immediately. Six of her crew were picked up by the steamer and four were drowned.

MR. WILLIAM J. McPHAIL, son of William McPhail, Esq., Supervisor of Falconwood Asylum, arrived home from St. Augustine, Florida, on Friday night. Previous to his departure from that place he was sumptuously entertained by his friends at the Beech Cottage Hotel. Mr. McPhail brought home several natural and other curiosities, among which is a live alligator.

JOHN TYLER, Frank and Mark Elwell, lads, were on New Chatham street, Lynn, Mass., when a thunder and lightning storm arose. Tyler was struck by lightning and instantly killed. Frank Elwell was struck upon the hands by the fluid and paralyzed for a time. Mark Elwell was also prostrated, but not much injured. Tyler was a colored lad, 12 years of age, and resided with his parents on Allen's court.

FISHING.—The Tishish correspondent of the Pioneer writes that lobster fishing has commenced, and fish are reported plenty in some sections. Herring fishing was pretty much a failure, and if imported bait has to be used for lobster fishing the outlook is not encouraging. Some mackerel have already been taken in herring nets, which is unusually early, considering that the ice has only recently left our shores. Large catches of herring have been taken in Cassepuce harbor, and lobsters are being caught in great plenty at Mimiquash. Lobsters have also struck into Souris in very large numbers. On Saturday last large catches were made, and a number of the packers were obliged to spend Sunday in search of hands to work in the factories in order to save the fish. These packers are strong believers in the "Ow in this Ditch" doctrine.

Mr. Murphy's Death.

St. JOHN, N. B., June 10.

William Murphy, Esq., of Charlottetown, died at the Royal Hotel here, yesterday, at 11 o'clock, of congestion of the lungs. His remains will be sent home to-morrow.

NEW YORK, June 9.

In reply to a statement said to have been made by Courtney, that no money was posted in the Ross-Courtney race, Richard K. Fox says that he received a check from Pilkington and Neagle for \$2,500, and to-day paid over to Wallace Ross \$2,000.

Burned by Lightning—Four Children Perished.

TORONTO, June 9.

A house owned and occupied by Alex. Carroll, at South Marsh, was struck by lightning Saturday night and set on fire. Four children were burned to death.

EDINBURGH, June 9.

A match game of cricket was played to-day between the gentlemen of Scotland and the Philadelphia team. The former were victorious, winning by five wickets.

A Doctor's Suicide.

LONDON, June 9.

A Swiss Doctor, who had been ruined by gambling, committed suicide at Monaco yesterday. This is the thirty-second suicide at Monaco this season.

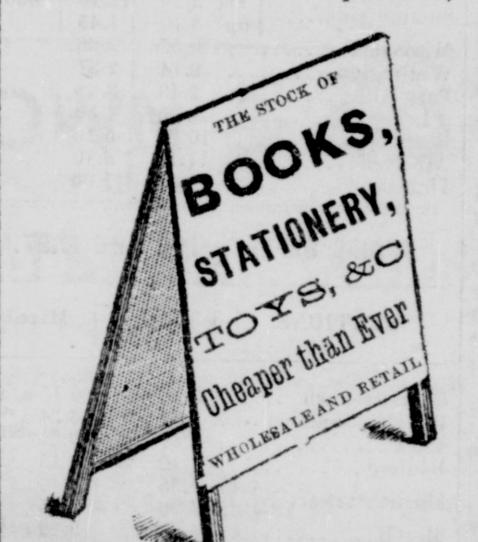
