

Glance Bay Miners In Surprising 1-0 Shutout Over Saint John Beavers

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Feb. 21 — (CP)—Glance Bay Miners arrived in this city after an eleven hour bus trip from Halifax and skated off with a 1-0 win over the league-leading Beavers in the only Maritime Major Hockey League game scheduled tonight.

Although Saint John had an edge in the play, Bob Arnell in the Miners nets was outstanding and when his mates gave him that one goal lead that appeared to be all he needed.

The visitors showed signs of their trip in the first period as Beavers took command of the play but the defensive work of the Poole-coached settee held and on two occasions did the Beavers come anywhere close to scoring. Around the eight minute mark Tom Smelle was in on the Glance Bay goalie but back-handed the shot wide of the cage. Then a few minutes later Dusty Blair gave a nice display of stick-handling to work his way in on the goalie but again Arnell was equal to the occasion.

The second period opened with Beavers making rush after rush into the Glance Bay zone when they did get through the passes were not just in the right place or else Arnell rose to great heights to thwart their scoring attempts. It was after one of the Beaver rushes that Miners scored their goal. On the return to Beavers end the puck was knocked back to the blue line where Dean McBride was stationed, he in turn shot it to Wywrot in the corner to the left of Gordon in the Saint John nets — Wywrot centred out to Leger who was parked almost on the Beaver's goal and Leger drilled it into the right hand corner. The time of the tally was 12:15 of the middle stanza.

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 21 — (CP)—The annual Canadian school curling competition ended today with Western knockout artists taking most of the glory.

The Gary Thode rink of Saskatchewan technical collegiate swept through the nine rounds without a loss and retained the Sifton trophy won last year. Six wins each put Manitoba and Nova Scotia into a tie for the runner-up spot. There was no playoff to break this deadlock.

Three rinks tied for third place, Alberta, Quebec and British Columbia having five wins each. Next came New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island with three while Northern Ontario won two and Ontario trailed with a single victory against eight losses.

A Charlottetown born hockey star is making quite a name for himself these days as coach of the Swedish team in the Olympics. He is "Bud" MacEachern, who learned his hockey here and who played with the Sydney Millionaires in the Cape Breton League around 1940 and with the Truro Bearcats following the war. Since playing with Truro, "Bud" has played in the English League for several seasons.

This year he took over the duties of coaching the Swedish Olympic team. Yesterday that team defeated the United States squad and is now in a first place tie with Canada in the team standings. Each team has won five and lost none for 10 points and they will meet tonight in the world hockey championship. All games are played in a huge open air arena. Yesterday we had the good fortune to see a post card depicting the arena fully lit up after night.

OSLO, Feb. 21 — (CP)—In the midst of all the fuss over playing tactics, the Canadians and Swiss tonight played one of the cleanest and fastest games of the Olympic hockey tournament and the Canadians breezed in winners 11-2.

It was the fifth straight for the undefeated Mercurys from Edmonton.

The big jolt of the tournament, however, came with the upset of the United States team 4-2 by Sweden, European champions, and it was the fifth straight for the Swedes too.

The still-favored Canadians meet the Swedes tomorrow night in a game that may well decide the championship.
