## \$1½-\$2 Million Sought To Stock New City Bldg.

TORONTO (CP) — It has been announced in Toronto that a campaign to raise between \$1½ and \$2 million to stock with the new Confederation Centre for the upkeep of the new Confederation Centre at Charlottetown will be launched shortly.

The Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building, whose \$5,000,000 construction cost is being met jointly by the federal and provincial governments, is nearing completion and will be the focus of Prince Edward Island's observance this year of the 100th anniversary of the meetings leading to Confederation.

"We feel it is a building for all of Canada," he said.

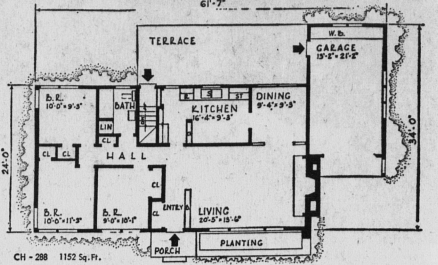
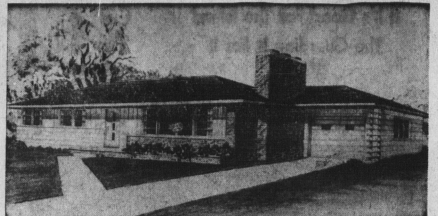

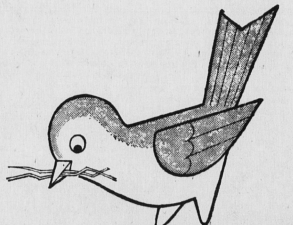

### Matheson Says Scheme Was Ignored

Opposition Leader A.W. Matheson said in the Legislature Wednesday that the Liberal government, until Ottawa would not have been defeated by the Progressive Conservatives in 1957 if the proposed scheme for a provincial premier had been put into effect by the administration.

Mr. Matheson's suggestion at a federal-provincial conference had been that the government give an administration grant to P.E.I. of \$2 million a year—they would have had to do the same for the other provinces—and it was the Liberal notice later.

The suggestion was made behind closed doors, and was regarded as secret at the time, but the conference is long since past and it is no harm to talk about it, the Liberal leader said Tuesday.

"If that grant had been made under the Liberal regime of St. Laurent would not have been upset in the election that followed," Mr. Matheson told the Legislature Wednesday.

(Continued From Page 1) The Boston market, the biggest for P.E.I. turnips — "the Irish can taste the P.E.I. variety" — he said.

Not more than five per cent of the island turnips go to the Maritime market, five to 10 per cent to Quebec, but the most go to the Eastern seaboard of the United States from Mr. O'Brien's. Other panelists included Reid Sangster, provincial marketing director; Finley Drake, Garth Harrison and Mr. Limpert, Chairman was Mr. Peacock.

### QUALITY IS ANSWER

The long distance we must have is the big hand-picked, a top quality product is the only answer, said Mr. O'Brien. Lack of uniformity in the stock is the most frequent criticism.

P.E.I. quality has improved substantially in the last 15 years, but Ontario has improved tremendously, he emphasized. But labor and keeping quality of the island turnip is superior and is preferred in Boston.

"When can we have your product in 14 good" are the two big questions Boston turnip buyers ask, said Mr. Sangster. They don't want it at all unless they can get it when they want it, and unless it is good quality.

"There is real hope still for our turnip industry, and they have to be steered correctly and the size stamped on the box so the people will know what they are getting," he said.
