### An Innocent Man.

SERVING A FIVE YEARS' SENTENCE IN AUBURN PRISON—CONVICTED OF A CRIME WHICH ANOTHER CONFESSES HAVING COMMITTED.

The Rochester Union says:—Illustrations of the fact that innocent men are sometimes tried and convicted of crimes with which they had no connection come to light occasionally. A case of this kind of more than ordinary interest came to the knowledge of a reporter of the Union this morning. In 1882 the Manufacturers' and Traders' Bank of Buffalo was made the victim of a fraudulent transaction to the extent of over \$2,000. A man giving the name of Watson opened an account at the bank and made a deposit, from which he drew small sums. When the original deposit was nearly exhausted he placed to his credit a New York draft made by the Bank of Commerce of Cleveland for \$3,000. The day after he checked out \$2,100. The draft was sent on to New York and was honored without question, but when it came back to the Bank of Commerce there was trouble. The draft had originally been made out for \$17, but had been skillfully raised to \$3,000. An investigation resulted in the arrest of a suspected party in Buffalo who, under the name of Watson, was tried, convicted and sentenced to Auburn for five years, which term he is at present serving. He was, it is said, duly identified by the bank officials, and all the evidence was strong against him.

At the time of the trial of Elliot and Edwards in this city for the Flour City and Commercial Bank forgeries, evidence was collected from all quarters, and among the documents which came into District Attorney Taylor's hands was a draft or cheque used in the Manufacturers' and Traders' Bank transaction. Mr. Taylor questioned George Edwards in regard to his possession of the cheque, and he admitted that he "placed" the draft in question in the Manufacturers' and Traders' Bank. Edwards also said that he knew that another man had been convicted of the crime, and was serving out a sentence for the same. The Buffalo operation was evidently the work of the same gang which defrauded Rochester parties. A Buffalo lawyer was in this city Saturday and called on District Attorney Taylor for the purpose of inquiring whether the signature of the Bank of Commerce draft was forged or genuine. It seems that there is now a suit between the banks, and the question whether the draft was simply raised or was wholly forged is material. Meanwhile an apparently innocent man is confined in Auburn State prison, and it seems as if steps should be taken by the proper authorities to secure his release. Immediately after Edwards' confession, Mr. Taylor wrote to the District Attorney of Erie County in relation to the same and suggested the release of "Watson," but nothing as yet has been done.

### Revenue and Taxation in Montreal.

The very large increase in the receipts of the city treasury for 1886 over 1885—says the Montreal Gazette—is a gratifying evidence at once of the steady growth of Montreal, and the healthy financial condition of its population. The figures are \$1,746,201 and \$1,602,700 for 1886 and 1885 respectively. In every item of current revenue the same state of affairs exists and this is in the face of the fact that there has been no raising of the rate of taxation. The increase all through is over 8 per cent., that on real estate assessments being fully 8 per cent., which is, no doubt, in most part due to the higher value of such property owing to its improvement by the erection of new buildings; and this item, it may be remarked, will be still greater in 1887, the building operations of the season just closed being on a greater scale than for several years past. In view of the fact that a municipal census will shortly be taken, it is unnecessary to speculate as to whether the growth of population has been in proportion to the increase of the revenue, but there is good ground to believe that it has, and that the completed returns will show Montreal to take high rank among the centres of population on the continent.

### The Caroline Islands.

GERMANY ABANDONS HER PROJECTED NAVAL STATION AT SPAIN'S REQUEST.

Spain, after a long and difficult diplomatic controversy, protracted largely through the hostile spirit of the German military authorities, has finally succeeded in inducing Prince Bismarck to abandon his proposal to establish a naval station at the Caroline Islands. Count de Benomar, the Spanish ambassador to Germany, in conversing with the German Chancellor about the merits of the case, attempted to minimize the importance of having a naval station at the Carolines, and argued that it would not be much for Germany to concede to Spain the withdrawal of the German project. Prince Bismarck corrected the Spanish ambassador, and said:—"It is because I recognize the value and importance of the station that I decide to abandon it in order to show the value I attach to Spanish friendship."

### Politics in the Northwest Territories.

Commenting on the prospects of Hon. Mr. Laird, the Ottawa correspondent of the Toronto Mail says:—"Mr. Laird may be very popular in the Saskatchewan, but is not likely to be elected nevertheless. It is certain that Hon. Thomas White will be offered the Conservative nomination, and should he decline it will go to Mr. Charles Blair, author of the poem 'Tecumseh,' who is the most popular man in the district, where the Conservatives largely predominate."

### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

#### The Georgetown Pilots

Sir,—In the issue of the Herald of the 1st inst., appears a communication from Ronald S. McDonald, Harbor Master, Grand River, who seems to be anxious to bring himself into public notice by casting reflections on the Georgetown pilots. As the article in question was evidently written not so much to sustain the reputation of Grand River as a harbor, as to give publicity to the jealousy arising from the success which hitherto attended the Georgetown pilots in the many instances in which they have taken vessels in and out of Grand River. True, the accident to the George Herold was one which might be averted, but if a mistake should be made by one man, it does not necessarily follow that a number of others are to be blamed as well, and should the intelligent Harbor Master of Grand River, as is his duty, desire to avoid further accidents, I would suggest that he have the buoys in the proper places, especially at this season, when vessels are passing in and out every day and accidents are likely to occur; and should he require any information in the placing of the buoys there are pilots in Georgetown who can teach him not only to put the buoys in their proper places, but to pilot a vessel in or out afterwards. The writer of the Herald says also that Georgetown pilots are injuring the shipping interests of Grand River by their ignorance and incompetency in piloting, but any injury done has been done principally by their own pilots, for, in nearly all cases where piloting large schooners has to be done, it is done by Georgetown pilots, without the aid of the harbor master's pilot-boat, which were thrown somewhere in the harbor, as the Government pays some one for it; and it is scarcely safe at any time for one to steer by them. In the future we trust that the harbor master of Grand River will attend to his own business first, and afterwards to the Georgetown pilots.

### Boston Markets.

DECEMBER 4.

EGGS.—Strictly fresh Eastern find a ready sale at 27 to 28¢, but other kinds are quiet. Choice P. E. Island command 24 to 25¢, and Canada 24¢.

POTATOES.—Choice Eastern Potatoes are in moderate supply, and command full prices. Provincial stock in large receipt, and prices are low and irregular, as the quality is rather poor.

FISH TRADE.—The fish market is passing through its quiet season and the volume of trade is light. Dealers are operating continuously, but stocks are small, and prices are on a steady basis. Mackerel are in light receipt, and higher rates are expected when trade revives. We quote Bay nominally at \$20 to \$25 for extras, \$17 to \$18 for No 1; \$13 to \$15 for No 2; and \$11 to \$12 for No 3. Nova Scotia and P. E. Island Mackerel rule at about previous prices. Sales of extra No 1 at \$25; ordinary No 1 at \$15 to \$18; No 2 at \$11 to \$13; and No 3 at \$8 to \$10 per bbl, including medium and large. Total receipt of Mackerel at Boston the past week 800 bbls, including 771 bbls from Provincial and 29 bbls from domestic ports.

### Another Cable.

A submarine cable, intended to connect New York and the capital of Brazil, is being manufactured in Paris, five hundred miles being already completed. It is expected that it will be laid and ready for use on the 1st of May next. The work is undertaken by a French company, which was first in the field. La Compagnie Telegraphique des Antilles, in union with the Mackay-Bennet company. The existing cable communication between these points is in the hands of English companies, and communications of Brazil reach England long before they arrive in New York. When the new direct cable is completed all this will be changed, and a despatch from Brazil to New York will arrive in two hours after it is sent.
