Back - to - School Movement in The Army Met With Enthusiasm

IN KOREA, (CP) - Lieut. Doug Wallace, the army's schoolmaster in Korea, gets a bang out of the way Canadian troops have tackled the army's back-to-school movement.

Wallace, from Barrie, Ont., supervises the simplified and standardized "three R" courses aimed at bringing men up to grade eight standard, and the voluntary spare-time courses in subjects ranging from navigation to bee-keeping.

The compulsory courses are conducted by unit officers in makeshift classrooms in tents and quonset huts. These consist of four one-hour classes a week. At the moment, 1,000 troops are attending these classes to bring themselves to the grade eight level. Most of these quit school in grades five, six or seven. The classes also include a small number, illiterate when they joined up.

Resented At First
Wallace said the first reaction of most soldiers when they hear of the compulsory education program is to resent it. They feel they didn't join the army to go back to school "but the great majority soon realize they can't win promotion unless they improve their educational qualifications so they dig in and get the most out of the courses."

The courses are designed for practical application not only to army promotion but to make them with her parents at Boomfield, Lot 7.

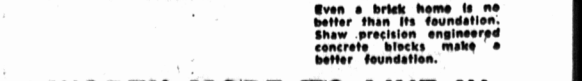

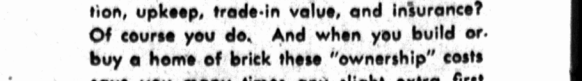
