

# Hungarian Gov't Seeking To Stem Flow Of Refugees

BUDAPEST (AP) — Hungarian government intensified efforts Tuesday to stop the flight of refugees and threatened a drastic purge of its opponents who are standing their ground.

The Communist party newspaper Nepszabadsag confirmed police now are checking trains for refugees at various stations and dragging them off.

A police detachment removed Communists as defector candidates from a single train. Nepszabadsag said many of them were "aging women, sick people and parents with small children."

Those suspected of nothing more than a desire to leave Hungary were brought back to Budapest and sent home, the party organ said. But a man accused of carrying "confidential maps and documents" was arrested.

The crackdown was revealed at a time when a Hungarian expedition as the result of mass unemployment and the back-to-Stalinism policies threatened in Premier Janos Kadar's government proclamation Sunday.

**CAN HAVE NO TRUCE**  
(Only 680 refugees crossed into Austria in the 24 hours up to noon Tuesday. This brought the total registered in Austria since the revolution to 161,378. Of these 92, 195 have been moved out to other Western countries.)

Nepszabadsag warned that the Kadar regime intends to "isolate and destroy" the remnants of the Hungarian revolution.

"There is no truce with the Hungarian counter-revolutionaries," the paper said. "Our fight against them will be pressed even where these hostile elements try to disguise themselves as Marxists and proclaim slogans about democratization and de-Stalinization."

Nepszabadsag explained why the secret meeting of leaders of five Communist bloc countries here last week was considered necessary. The meeting was presided over by Soviet party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev and Deputy Premier Georgi Malenkov. It included representatives from Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Romania and Hungary.

Nepszabadsag said this meeting was necessary because "during the

brief history of the people's democracies, the Hungarian revolt was the first time that an intensifying aimed against the rule of the workers was carried out."

This followed the Moscow line of branding the Hungarian revolt as a "counter-revolution carried out by reactionaries and fascists."

## Court Adjourns Due To Storm

The Supreme Court, presided over by Justice Mark R. MacGuigan, opened its January session yesterday morning. Due to storm conditions, only two members of the grand jury arrived for the opening and the Court was adjourned until Friday, January 11, when it is expected that the grand jury will be sworn in. Only one case is under consideration of the court, that of Edward Matthews, Charlottetown, on a charge of criminal negligence in the operation of a motor vehicle resulting in injuries causing death. Attorney-General A. W. Matheson and J. P. Nicholson are representing the Crown.

He disclosed that a search is being made for Miss McDonald's pyjama trousers. That was the first disclosure that some of her apparel was missing.

Parker said the re-enactment later Monday would be part of what he termed "a full-scale investigation" of the blonde's mysterious disappearance.

Parker said Miss McDonald was wearing only the tops of her pyjamas under her housecoat when found late Friday night on a desert highway near Indio 150 miles to the southeast.

The 33-year-old movie glamor girl told officers here kidnappers forced her to take off the pyjama bottoms "apparently some time during the ride from Los Angeles into the desert," he added.

## Devotes Editorial To Railway Strike

LONDON (CP) — The Manchester Guardian Tuesday devoted its principal editorial—some 1,000 words and slightly more than column length—to the Canadian rail strike.

The newspaper traces the strike mainly to a "clear dispute about automation." It says the brotherhood (of firemen and engineers) gives the impression that it is fighting not for "progress but for obsolescence and padded costs."

It would be easier to feel sympathy for the brotherhood if the firemen concerned "were in danger of becoming unemployed or suffering because the skill they may have achieved is no longer wanted."

## Brazil To Produce Own Newsprint

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)—The president of a large paper machinery firm said Tuesday Brazil will be able to produce all the newsprint it needs in five years.

K. F. Landegger, president of Parsons and Whittemore, New York and chairman of Black-Clawson Company, Hamilton, Ohio, said that for the first time a complete line of paper and pulp machinery is being manufactured in Latin America.

Landegger said that eventually this will mean the end of Brazil's imports of \$50,000,000 a year of newsprint and wood pulp.

He said that in five years his company could export machinery made in Brazil for use in mills especially in Argentina and Chile.

## Claims In Liner Sinking 100 Million

NEW YORK (AP)—Court claims growing out of the collision of the Swedish liner Stockholm and the Italian liner Andrea Doria now surpass \$100,000,000 it was disclosed Monday.

To date, 950 claims amounting to \$71,500,000 have been filed against the Swedish American Line, and 1,150 claims totalling \$45,000,000 against the Italian Line.

Biggest claim is the Italian Line's \$30,000,000 suit against the Swedish American Line for loss of the Andrea Doria.
