TELLING THE PATIENT HE HAS CANCER

Some weeks ago I wrote an article on what Philadelphia physicians told their cancer patients. Many physicians thought the patient and relatives should be told the truth without delay.

A letter from Otis R. Bowen, Bremen, Indiana, gives answer to the suggestions contained in the article and refers the Philadelphia physicians to an article published in the Journal of the Indiana State Medical Association, April, 1953, entitled "Should the Patient Be Told When Diagnosis is Cancer?"

Dr. Bowen conducted a survey of patients (477) between the ages of 18 and 90 in this area, to determine if the patients wished to know whether or not they had cancer, whether they desired that their close relatives be told if they were afflicted with cancer.

The answers to Dr. Bowen's questionnaire were about what we might expect in these days when the majority of our men and women want to know the truth.

In general, the greatest number of persons not only desired to know the truth but also desired that their close relatives be informed. A large majority did not feel that patients should be fooled. An overwhelming number thought the physician should be the one to tell the patient about the illness.

Many persons expressed the desire for co-operation between the physician, minister and close relatives in handling the situation. The age group of 31 to 50 seemed more cancer conscious than the younger age groups.

Dr. Bowen found that the reasons patients have for wanting to know the truth about whether or not they have cancer are far more numerous and important than the physicians ever dreamed. "Patients have shown that they can take the truth better than the dreadful fear and indecision of whether their physician is trying to shield them from the fact that they actually have cancer."

A final point is that the type of treatment used—X-ray, radium, or surgery—shows the intelligent patient that he likely has cancer.

Contract Bridge

A KNOTTY PROBLEM
One of the most difficult problems a defender can face is illustrated in the following deal:

North dealer. Both sides vulnerable.
North: ♠ J 3, ♠ A 7, ♠ A Q J 10 9 5 2, ♠ K 8.
South: ♠ A 9 8, ♠ 5 4, ♠ Q 8 4 2, ♠ 7 3, ♠ 9 5.
West: ♠ K 10 6, ♠ K 10 9, ♠ 8 4, ♠ A 10 6 3 2.
East: ♠ J 3, ♠ A 7, ♠ A Q J 10 9 5 2, ♠ K 8.

The bidding: North 1♠, East Pass, South 2♠, West Pass. North 3♠, East Pass, South 3NT, West Pass.

North did not accept the three-trump contract with full confidence, but he finally decided that it might be fatal to reach for a minor-suit game.

West opened the five of spades. Dummy played low. East put up the queen, and declarer took the trick with the king.

Now observe the vast difference if, at the first trick, East had played the spade seven instead of the queen. South could do no better than win the ten, and now, as he lost the diamond finesse, the hand would figuratively "blow up in his face."
