IN MEMORIAM

J. HAROLD McIVER

Not often has the passing of a citizen affected so many people as profoundly as did the death of J. Harold McIVER of Summerside who passed away on June 10th at the home of his brother Charles.

The fact that his devoted wife, who was in Montreal at that time, was unable to be with him during his last hours made his sudden passing even more tragic.

A knee infection began to bother him in November and he had been ill for the greater part of the winter but he was starting to feel stronger in the spring and hopes were held for his complete recovery. This was not to be and death was caused by coronary thrombosis as a result of the weakened condition of his heart due to previous attacks of rheumatic fever.

Mr. McIVER was born thirty-nine years ago at Kinkora, and was a son of Mrs. T. A. McIVER and the late Mr. McIVER of that place.

He received his early education at his home school in Kinkora, then went to St. Dunstan's University.

After leaving St. Dunstan's he worked for a time with his father in the potato and fertilizer business.

Gifted with unusual talents of salesmanship he accepted in 1935, the position of chief automobile salesman with Corney Bros., Summerside. Ten years later he became a local representative of the Imperial Life Assurance Co. He qualified for Production Club membership during the following three successive years and was awarded trips to various parts of Canada. Success in salesmanship came as a result of his friendly personality, because people knew him for a man of integrity and a willing helper of all who needed aid and above all because as one man described Harold—"always a gentleman."

His place in the sports realm of Summerside will be hard to fill. He was President of the Summerside Hockey Club for three years in succession and as manager guided the team through difficulties and discouragements that would daunt a man of lesser courage and moral stature than he. At his death tributes were paid him by the M.A.H.A. executive and other prominent sports leaders with whom he associated.

Harold was an active member of the Kinsmen Club, Knights of Columbus and the Holy Name Society, the members of which attended the funeral and marched from the house to the church.

The funeral was held at St. Paul's Church on Monday, June 12th and was the largest seen in Summerside for many years. Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father J. H. LeClair. Present also in the sanctuary were Rev. A. J. MacLeod, Rev. J. W. McCordie, Rev. Wilfred Keefe and Rev. J. Kelly.

The pallbearers were Lorne Driscoll, Dr. Vincent Grant, Constable D. S. Davies, R.C.M.P., Norman MacDonald, Hugh John McIVER, John C. Gallant, Daniel MacKinnon, William Lidgen.

After the Mass the remains were taken to his former parish in Kinkora, where a service was held at St. Malachy's Church by the parish priest, Rev. Francis McQuaid, who also performed the last rites at the grave. Present in the sanctuary in Kinkora were Rev. Wilfred Keefe, Rev. J. W. McCordie, Rev. Fr. C. J. McIVER.

The large number of Mass Cards, wreaths of flowers and messages of sympathy showed the high esteem in which he was held, and the throngs of people who came to his home to pay their last respects during Sunday afternoon and evening indicated the deep affection of all.

He leaves to mourn his wife, the former Kathleen Ready of Kensington, his mother, and the following brothers and sisters, Charles in Summerside, John D. in Victoria, B.C., Emmet in Sarnia, Ont., Mrs. J. A. Brown (Beretta) Grand River, P. E. I., Mrs. J. E. Kelly (Tena), Charlottetown, Mrs. Mark Hagen (Mary) Charlottetown and Mrs. Don MacPherson (Blanche) Burden.

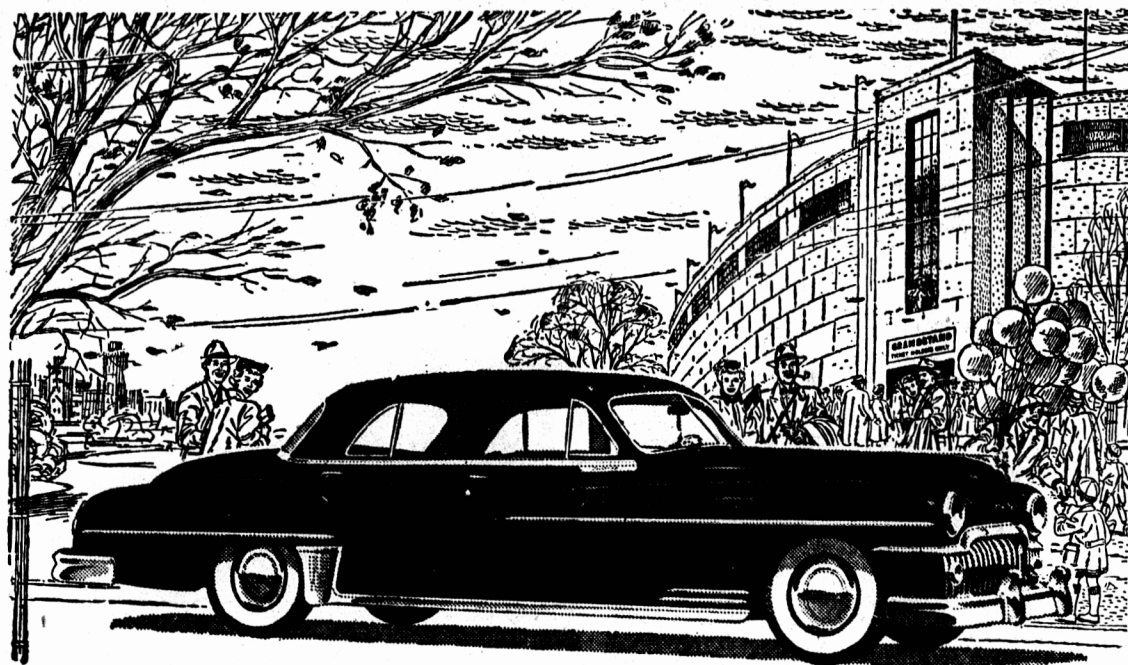
Harold has passed on before us but the memory of his friendly smile and undaunted courage will live long in the hearts of his friends.
