Hurricane Leaves 34 Dead, Millions In Damage In U.S.

Streets Flooded At Montreal

MONTREAL (CP) — Streets were flooded, trees toppled and traffic and communications were disrupted Tuesday as the front edge of a hurricane that slashed the northeastern United States swept into southern Quebec.

BOSTON, (AP) — Vicious Hurricane Carol battered the northeastern United States Tuesday and swept into southern Quebec after taking at least 34 lives including one Canadian in wind flurries unknown here since the multi-million dollar hurricane of 1938 killed more than 300.

Huge Furniture Store In Suburban St. John's, Nfld., Burns; Firemen Helpless

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — A huge suburban furniture store was destroyed by fire Tuesday, two weeks before its official opening, as firemen stood by helplessly with no water supply.

AMENDMENTS PREDICTED

Last-minute amendments to strengthen the treaty were predicted by SEATO delegates here. A pact on the pattern of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, with specific military commitments, was one alternative mentioned.

Admiral Raymond Spruance, U.S. ambassador to the Philippines, meanwhile protested against the newspaper leak, and President Ramon Magasaysay ordered a full investigation into the incident.

The published version of the American draft provides recognition of a "common danger" in Communist aggression south of 21 degrees, 30 minutes north latitude, which leaves out Formosa but covers southern Indochina. It also provides for peaceful settlement of international disputes, maintenance of strength through self-help and mutual aid, and common measures against subversive activities.
