A petition has been presented to the United States Senate asking for the abolition of the "American House of Lords."

A By-Law for Levying and Specifying the Rate of Assessment on Real Estate, Personal Property and Incomes in the City of Charlottetown.

(Passed 15th May, 1886.)

BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. The rate of Assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1886, and ending 31st December, A. D. 1886, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City, in their valuation rolls of such Real Estate, made and duly returned by them on the Eight day of April, A. D. 1886.

2nd. The rate of Assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1886, and ending 31st day of December, A. D. 1886, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-half of one per cent, on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in their Valuation Roll of such personal property made and duly returned by them on the Eight day of April, A. D. 1886.

3rd. The rate of assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1886, and ending 31st December, A. D. 1886, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-tenth of one per cent, on every dollar of the amount of the net yearly Income salaries, or receipts, of all persons, partnerships and corporations, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in their Valuation Roll of such Income, made and duly returned by them on the Eight day of April, A. D. 1886.
