EXPENSIVE TROTTERS.—The Woodward and Shanklin's sale at Lexington, Ky., was concluded on the closing day by the offering of five choicely bred trotters, the property of M. Salisbury, of Pleasanton, Cal. The gem of the sale was Margaret S., 2 1/2, the fastest mare ever sold at public auction. H. S. Henry Morrillville, Penn., started her at \$5,000. She was quickly run up to \$10,000, the bidders being Don J. Leather and Mr. Henry A. H. Moore, of Philadelphia, then cried \$12,500, and she was knocked down to him for \$10,250, which makes Mr. Moore the owner of more high-priced mares than any breeder in the United States. The five head sold by Mr. Salisbury realized \$19,400, an average of \$3,880. During the day seventy-two horses changed hands for \$24,490, an average of \$337. During the six days of the Woodward & Shanklin sale 339 head sold for \$381,455, an average of \$1,125, which makes it one of the greatest combination sales of trotters ever held.
