TOWN SCHOOLS.—Last Spring, through the politeness of Mr. Pippy, we were favoured with a copy of the report of the state of the schools in Woburn, Mass. Although in many respects ably drawn up, yet it does not contain the data which would enable us to institute a fair comparison between the primary schools of Woburn and those of this City. Public examinations have been held during the week of the different female schools under the control of the Board of Education, and also of the boys school taught by Mr. Roche. We were unable to witness all of them, but what we did see, we consider highly satisfactory. That first element of success, good discipline, as far as could be judged from one occasion, seems to be duly attended to. The manner of reading of the different classes in all of them was really good, the geography, especially one of Mr. Roche's classes, equally so. The more prominent defects were, first, that in some of them writing from dictation is not sufficiently attended to, and in one, overlooked altogether; and secondly, that recitation seems to form a class in none of them, at least there was no specimen exhibited.—Com.

THE CONCERT.—A vocal and instrumental concert in aid of the Indian Relief Fund, given by Miss Sophia Duchemin, assisted by several amateurs, came off on Tuesday evening last, in the Temperance Hall. Although the evening was very unpropitious—a severe storm of rain and hail raging at the time—a considerable number of the elite of Charlotetown and vicinity attended, and were, doubtless, highly gratified by the musical talent displayed on this occasion. Of Miss Duchemin's abilities, both as a pianist and vocalist, it is unnecessary to say a word in this community. Suffice it that she was ably supported by the other ladies and gentlemen who so largely contributed to the pleasure of the entertainment, as well as by Capt. Lobban and the members of his Band. The amount realized by the concert we have not yet ascertained.—Monitor.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE EXAMINER.

Mr. Editor,—You have probably seen the editorial in the Protector of the 16th inst., calling the attention of the public to the Young Men's Christian Association. Perhaps you will allow one of the young men belonging to that Association to offer a few suggestions for the consideration of its directors. This Institute, if properly conducted, might be rendered useful in forming the characters of young men—even now the Bible class in connection with it is in very efficient operation and very creditably managed. But these "Lectures"—what can we say of them? They are, sir, in general, the most flimsy commonplace spouting imaginable. 'Tis true there are exceptions; for example, the lecture by the Rev. Mr. Snodgrass—eloquent, dignified and to the purpose; and one or two—perhaps more—since. But, sir, it is downright abuse of time for any young man, who has books and ordinary talent, to sit listening to the generality of these "lectures." The opening lecture for this season was a perfect specimen of this effete oratory. The lecture was a warning to young men, and pointing out the temptations to be most guarded against. And what do you think we were first cautioned to avoid? Why, the Theatre. This, sir, puts one in mind of the old woman who sat crying over the well, and when asked what she cried for, answered: "Oh," said she, "if I had children they'd be in danger of falling into this horrid well." Next came Drinking; and here we had a bit of temperance oratory: "Don't," said the lecturer, "give your Bank Notes for whiskey." The words italicised are plainly an allusion to Mr. Coles's advertisement—they were delivered as such, understood as such, and greeted with some cheering. Now, sir, here is hypocrisy or inconsistency, or both, with a vengeance. These temperance and Christian lecturers can't bear the thought of whiskey—much less of a brewery; yet, for the paltry price of an advertisement, they point out to the public this "sink of hell"—this "fire of damnation" in capital letters through the columns of the ubiquitous Protector. The language in the Hall is, "don't buy whiskey; give the editing of 'Committee' a few shillings and the language of the Protector is, "whoever has Bank Notes can get first-rate whiskey for them at Coles's Brewery." Oh consistency! Next in order came Smoking. The lecturer described a brat of a boy swaggering along with a cigar in his mouth, and thinking himself a man. Conceit in a boy is despicable, but want of judgment in a man is worse. The lecturer might know that some who are men—and that among his hearers—smoke; and, therefore, his proper course would be to show, on scientific principles, and by statistics and quotations from competent authorities, (if he were able) that tobacco is injurious. But, no, "talk is cheap," and I suspect the ability was wanting. Seriously, Mr. Editor, is that the way to convince sensible men? Tippling and smoking are habits I abominate; and thank God, although a "boy," I equally abominate inconsistency and drivelling nonsense. Among the amusements reprobated by the lecturer was Dancing. The lecturer might know, if he attended the Bible class, that this is a subject upon which even the members of the Association are divided in opinion, and, consequently, more argument and less dogmatism would have been more appropriate. With your leave, Mr. Editor, I shall, on some future occasion, show that Dancing (not the abuse of Dancing) is not only not at variance with the revealed law of God, but consistent with all natural laws and common sense, and countenanced and approved of by some of the greatest and most pious of men. The line of life and living for a young man, chalked out by the lecturer, was so constrained that none but a man broken down by misfortunes or age could lead it. The reason is plain. He took too limited, too narrow a view of mankind; he forgets that man is not only moral but also intellectual, and—what he seemed never to have dreamt of—that man is an animal; yes, an animal that tickling pleases and pinching hurts. According to the lecturer's views, the corner-stone of virtue is founded on ignorance—ignorance of what is wrong. Hence, I presume, his ground for denouncing the reading of works of fiction. This advice is, I hesitate not to say, downright nonsense—for what is a great part of English literature but fiction? Witness Shakespeare, Milton, Dryden—in short all our poetry; Smollett, Scott, Thackeray, Dickens, Washington Irving, &c. &c., without reading which a young or old man cannot be reckoned intelligent. Of course every person who has a taste for reading will practically and very properly disregard such absurd "advice." As a conclusion to this lecture, we were told that two ministers, a doctor and a lawyer came from London, in a vessel—that's queer, ain't it? And not only that, but two of these emigrants have since died, and one at least (who was the lecturer) did not die! Was not that worth knowing? The chairman passed a high eulogium on "the very able lecture," &c., much against his conscience if all was known; for I defy any man or woman of the chairman's intelligence and education to praise such effete inanity with a clear conscience. Such is a sample of our "Lectures." And sorry was I, for one, to be obliged to listen to it. If young men are to be attracted, let us have something worthy of men—scientific, historical, ethical, or whatever you like; but from vulgarisms and commonplace, good Lord deliver us. Published by Authority. A Law in amendment of the City Bye-Law relating to Drunkenness. [Assented to, 17th Dec., 1857.]

WHEREAS the fines of five shillings and ten shillings, imposed by the first and second sections of the said Bye-Law, have been found on frequent occasions to be by the violent conduct of offenders, both before and after being taken into custody, inadequate to the offence: Be it therefore enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown: That it shall be lawful for the Police Court to inflict a fine not exceeding twenty shillings, with costs, upon any person found guilty of being drunk and disorderly, within the provisions of the said Bye-Law, whether for the first or any subsequent offence, any thing in the said Bye-Law to the contrary notwithstanding.
