Kingston has imported a Roman Catholic bishop from Ireland. The Rev. Dr. Cleary, of Dungarvin, recently promoted from the office of parish priest, has received the diocesan appointment from His Holiness the Pope.

The public debt of the United States is being reduced at a very rapid rate. On the 31st of August, 1865, when it reached its highest point after the war, it was, less cash in the Treasury, \$2,756,431,571. Every year since then, excepting, in 1869, it has been reduced by large sums—the total amount paid during the fifteen years ending the 31st August, 1880, being \$888,093,104. At that date the debt, less cash in the Treasury, was \$1,924,569,074. It is still a vast sum, but it is more satisfactory that it should be steadily growing less rather than greater, like our own.

Considerable interest has been aroused among English antiquaries and students of history by the discovery of the remains of a Roman villa in the Isle of Wight. The site is on Morton Farm, near Brading, the property of Lady Oglander, the present occupant of the property being a Mr. Cooper. They have both given their consent to the prosecution of investigations on the spot and already the work has been vigorously begun. The first discovery was made by Captain Thorpe, whose knowledge of the neighborhood led him to make the explorations which proved successful. The external walls, which measure 52 by 37 feet, have been found to enclose six or seven chambers, with passages, which it is thought, lead to other chambers. There are tessellated floors, flues, hypocausts, fresco paintings, roofing tiles, coins, pottery, and a mosaic pavement of curious design, which the learned in such matters are engaged in interpreting. The design on another mosaic more recently discovered is a representation of Orpheus playing on the lyre, with the animal subdued by his musical power around him. Among the coins are some of the age of Victorius, of the third quarter of the third century. The investigation, when complete, is expected to throw much light on the occupation of the island by the Romans. There are some who think that the natives, in their dark complexion and brilliant eyes, have obvious indications of their Roman origin.

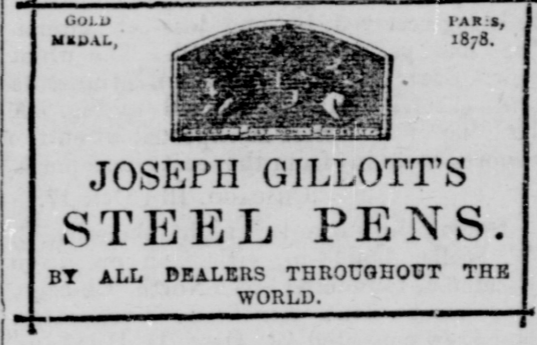
