Durelle fell head first to the concrete apron and was knocked unconscious. He was taken to hospital without having regained consciousness.

Four Highland Records Broken

ANTIGNON, N.S. (CP)—Four records fell on opening day Friday of the 100th running of the Highland Games here. Despite steady morning rain and mist in the afternoon new marks were established.

Meet officials postponed scheduled morning events and jammed the afternoon session that lasted until 8 p.m.

Joe Sider of Halifax won the junior 100-yard dash in 10.1 seconds, slicing two tenths of a second from the previous mark set in 1955 by Dave Lucas of Annapolis Royal, N.S., and tied in 1958 by Al McNichol of St. Stephen, N.B.

In the juvenile 100-yard dash, Mike Battillon of Halifax went in 10.2 and clipped two tenths of a second off the record set in 1955 by the same McNichol. The juvenile discus record was smashed by David Jones of Bridgetown, N.S. He covered 133 feet, 10 1/2 inches compared with 127 feet, six inches by Jerome MacDonell of the Iqoish Highland Society in 1952.

John Steele of Central Kings, N.S., won the midge top-kick jump when he cleared 39 feet, 9 1/2 inches. The record of 39 feet, 1 1/2 inches was set in 1906 by H. L. Jackson of Annapolis, N.S.
