

Summerside And Prince County Queens Candidates See Working Majority

WOOD ISLANDS WEST - Reaction of the Diefenbaker government with a working majority was predicted for Monday night by Fisheries Minister Angus MacLean. He was speaking at a Progressive Conservative rally in the community hall.

Also speaking at the meeting was Heath Macquarrie, Mr. MacLean's colleague in the dual constituency of Queens and Summerside.

He stated that in his position he was required to travel in many countries and to attend many international meetings. Everywhere he saw evidence of the high regard in which Canada was held.

He said the opposition no longer stuck to prophesies. Production has much increased and the economy of the country is much better because of that.

He quoted from the report of the government of the Bank of Canada on the beneficial effect of the dollar devaluation and also mentioned the favorable balance of trade which this country has enjoyed during the last year.

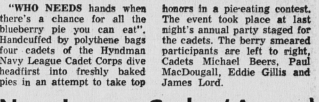
The score of Harvey, first-round leader at 81, rose with the wind to a par 72.

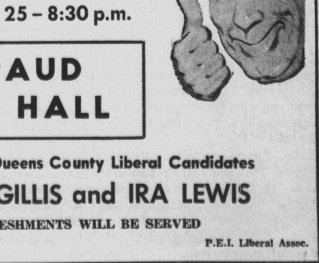
