THE SCHOOL BOARD.—At a meeting of the City School Board, held on the 4th inst., the following resolution was unanimously passed, viz.: Resolved, That as the part taken by the scholars of the city schools in connection with the Queen's jubilee proved to be one of the most pleasing features of the celebration, the Board desire to mark their high sense of the cordial co-operation of the teachers of said schools in bringing about so desirable a result.

As the part taken by the scholars attending the City Schools was one of the most pleasing features of the Jubilee celebration, the following resolution unanimously passed by the School Board at their meeting on Monday night, was well-timed:—

Resolved, That the Board desire to express their warmest approval of the cordial manner in which the teachers of the City Schools accepted the invitation extended to them by the Board to attend with their scholars, and take part in the celebration of Her Majesty's Jubilee.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Bishop Elect.

HALIFAX, July 7. The Synod, by a majority of both houses, on the first ballot, elected Rev. Dr. Edgill, Chaplain General of the British army, to the vacant bishopric. Dr. Edgill had a majority of fifty clergymen and eight laymen over Bishop Sullivan of Algoma. Dr. Edgill was formerly Garrison Chaplain of Halifax. While a pronounced High Churchman he is not a party man, and is a most liberal-minded and hard-working Priest. He is an excellent preacher and eminent Christian gentleman. He has lately been appointed Chaplain to the Tower of London, and last autumn the Archbishop of Canterbury conferred upon him the Lambeth degree of Doctor of Divinity—a mark of high confidence and esteem. His present salary is \$10,000,—as Bishop of Nova Scotia it will be \$3,000 per annum.

The "Cass" Affair

LONDON, July 6. The conduct of the Government over the Cass affair has caused discontent even among the warmest supporters of the Ministry. The explanation by Mr. Smith in the Commons was heard in the chilliest silence, except when he announced that the Lord High Chancellor would institute a thorough inquiry. In consequence of the feeling in the Conservative party, Matthews has offered to resign. He has been requested to remain in office until the close of the present session of Parliament.

Great Fire at Quebec.

QUEBEC, July 6, (midnight.) About midnight a fire broke out in the barracks at the citadel. It spread to the buildings inside the citadel, and grave fears are entertained that it may reach the magazine. The City Fire Brigade are unable to copy with the flames.

Terrible Accident.

BERNE, July 6. Half of the new quays at Zug fell into the lake last night. Forty houses are crowded in, and the hotel Zurich, a four-story structure, full of visitors, vanished entirely. The occupants were engulfed while they slept. At least 100 persons perished, including the President of the Canton. Men are now trying to rescue the bodies. An infant was found alive in a floating cradle. Later advices from Zug state that 25 houses were engulfed, and that 20 persons are missing.

Not Favorably Entertained.

OTTAWA, July 6. Mr. Kamper, whose Intercolonial propositions to the Government were not favorably entertained, sailed from New York yesterday for Europe. He returns to Paris to consult the Rothschilds' and other interested capitalists to see if the new scheme cannot be prepared.

Another M. P. Gone.

MONTREAL, July 6. Mr. Duchesnay, M. P. for Beauce, is dead from typhoid fever. The Conservatives of La Prairie have selected Dr. Bresson, of La Prairie, as their candidate in the approaching contest, O. Couette, Liberal candidate.

The Turf.

LONDON, July 6. The race for the Imperial gold cup was run at the Newmarket meeting to-day. It was won by the Duke of Westminster's colt Orondox. Chetwind's chestnut colt Whitefriar came in 2nd, and Lord Hastings bay colt Lovegold third.

Drowning Accident.

TORONTO, July 6. Thos. Lightfoot, aged 18, and a little Italian fiddler, were drowned here to-day. Lightfoot went to the rescue of the boy, who grabbed him around the neck, and both sank.

Wedding Bells.

HALIFAX, July 7. W. J. Tupper, son of Sir Charles, was quietly married yesterday to the daughter of Chief Justice McDonald.

A Fatal Plunge.

BERNE, July 7. One hundred persons perished at Zurich and Zugly. Over forty hours falling into the lake.
