Stresses Strategic Value Of Railway In The Far North

BOSTON, Dec. 13 — The immense strategic value of the railroad lines extending into the sparsely populated regions of the Far North to the security of the North American continent was stressed here last night by S. F. Dingle of Montreal, vice-president of operation, Canadian National Railways.

In a talk before members of the New England railroad club, Mr. Dingle said: "There are men in the Pentagon, in Ottawa and Whitehall, who, looking at a map of this continent, are thankful today that some of those far northern and so-called unprofitable lines are on it."

"All values are not metallic and there is profit in how securely men sleep at night."

The vast territories of the north are the least understood and most completely appreciated areas of the continent, he declared. "The country just south of the roof of the world has potentialities and national and continental significance which have been obscured partly by events and partly by lack of popular understanding."

"For generations we have been good neighbors, exchanging our material, trading with one another," he continued. "You have invested millions in Canada and you have sent your people to live among us and become Canadians. As my country has grown in stature and in importance in the world, and as the way of life we believe in has been threatened, we have become more than neighbors; we have become partners."

"In the 1950 version of the Hyde Park agreement recently concluded is a very good example of how closely we work together. Our economies are virtually meshed. In the realm of hemispheric strategy we are working as team-mates. You know about our combined operations in the air, on sea and in the northland. You know that we are with you in the United Nations action in Korea."

Motor Vehicle Sales Increase

OTTAWA, Dec. 13—(CP) — In October Canadians invested an average of \$2,500,000 a day in new cars and trucks. Every day, counting Sunday, they bought an average of 1,100 of them, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

In 1950, if they keep up the pace set in the first 10 months of the year, they will crack the \$900,000,000-mark for investment in that field.

Sales rose 17 per cent over October, 1949, as compared to the 49 per cent the first 10 months of the year showed over the corresponding period of 1949.

The number of cars financed on long-term deals rose 38 per cent over October 1949. The total for the first 10 months was up 71 per cent.

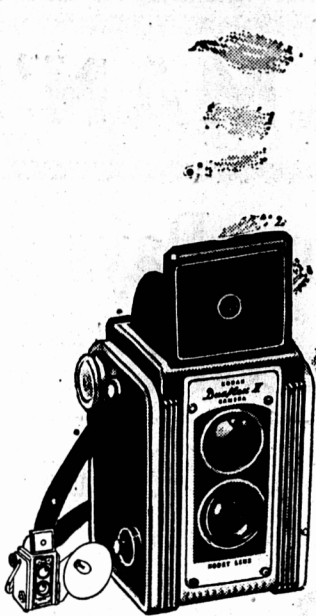
Alexander MacInnis Dies In Butte, Montana

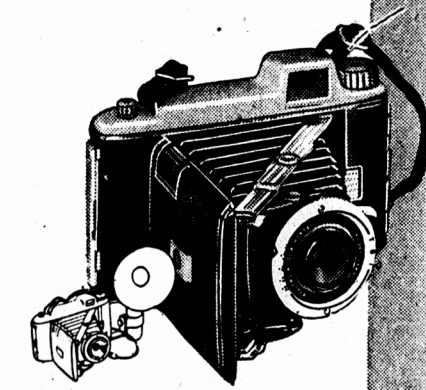

shire. A sister, Mrs. Allan Cummings predeceased him some years ago. Burial was in Butte.



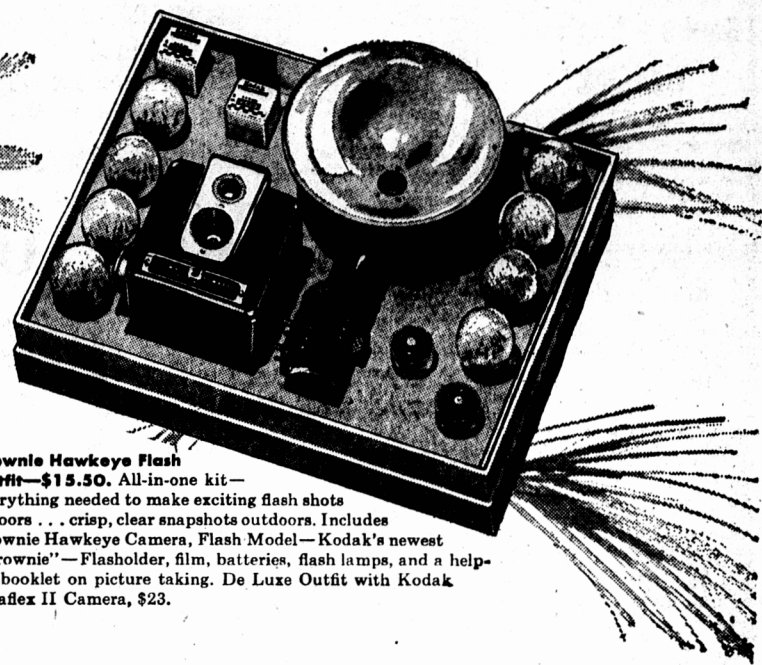
