

# BYC Edges Parkdale 4-2

## Whitlock Shoots Winner & Clincher In Thrilling Game

Cagey Buck Whitlock fired home two goals in the third period and set up another to lead the Basilica Youth Club to a 4-2 victory over Parkdale Flyers before a crowd of over 1,000 fans at the Sports Arena last night.

The victory squared the Island Hockey League best-of-seven semi-final series at 1-1. Playing without the services of left-winger Merrill Pineau, out with an eye injury, and defenseman Arnold Mullins, coach Spy Ready shuffled his forwards, dropped back on defense himself, and came up with a winning combination. Ready moved up Jack Burke and Lloyd Shepherd with Whitlock at center and the trio came through with three of the four goals.

Scoring both of Parkdale's goals, Orrin Carver gave the Flyers the lead twice. His first goal, which came in the initial period, was the only marker of the first two periods. B. Y. C. tied it up in the third, but Carver put his team out in front once again, before the youth clubbers, driving all the way, came through with three in a row.

Whitlock's final goal came at 19:17 of the third period after coach Allie Carver yanked Frank Roper in favor of another forward. Whitlock got the draw from Junior MacLeod from a faceoff deep in B. Y. C. territory and gollied the disc all the way down the ice for the goal that clinched the youth club's first victory.

Jackie Burke fired the youth club's first goal and Johnny Squarebriggs scored the other. The game was a thriller from the opening whistle and featured some of the finest hockey seen at the Sports Arena this year. Both teams were playing it close to the vest and both were back-checking like fiends.

Thane Doyle stopped a remarkable game for the youth club and held them up time and again when they appeared to be sagging. Doyle was particularly hot in the second period when he turned aside 12 drives. He had little or no chance on either of the goals that beat him.

Frank Roper too played sensationally. He didn't have much to do in the second frame, but in the first and third the youth club drives that found the net were invariably hot ones. Parkdale's defense was almost as tight as those thrown up by the youth club, but in the third they faltered and Whitlock led the way home.

**CLEAN GAME**  
The game was rough in spots and some heavy bodychecks were handed out. But it was a cleanly played game and referees Jack Kane and Don Whelan didn't let it get out of hand for a moment. They assessed 7 penalties, 4 to Parkdale, and all minors.  
Orrin Carver shot the only goal of the first period at the 15:10 mark. He broke up a youth club attack before it really got started, deked his way around Art Perry and skated right in on Doyle to blast it home.

### IN THIS CORNER

#### The Fabulous Frenchman

This Maurice Richard is a fabulous hockey player. Probably the greatest of all time. Today at 35, the "Rocket", as he has become widely known, seems to be just about as good as he ever was. Against Toronto Wednesday night Richard scored his 30th goal of the season and raised his lifetime total to a tremendous 400 goals. A couple more red-hot nights and the Flying Frenchman could conceivably hit that magic 500 mark before the season is over. You may not like the guy but you have to give him his due. No hockey player, in his good old days or today, has ever come close to the Rocket's accomplishment. And in the next 10 years, only two players, Jean Beliveau and Gordie Howe have any chance of dimming the Richard star.

In this day, when U.S. colleges heads are making fools of themselves (and, we might add getting themselves in to a lot of trouble) chasing string bean basketball players with offers of cars, etc., and baseball men are passing around huge bonuses to budding stars, it might come as a bit of a shock to many to find out that Richard simply walked into the Canadiens as a free gift. Way back in 1941 Richard simply walked into the Canadiens' dressing room and told Dick Irvan that he was interested in playing for his hometown team. Irvan gave him a chance and never regretted it, except possibly when he was coaching the Black Hawks.

Injuries sidelined Richard for most of the initial season, but Irvan knew he had a find. Since he has never once gone under the 20-goal mark in one season, he has scored 30 goals in one season's play far more often than anyone else, and of course everyone knows that his 50 in one season is a league record. Although some of our younger hockey followers may forget that Richard scored those 50 goals when the N.H.L. season was only 50 games in length. Today with 76 games played, the great stars of the game are finding it tough to come up with 40.

The fact that he is still playing and still scoring potshots of goals is remarkable. Although he was never a corner-crowder like Ted Kennedy, nor a back checker of note,

The winner came at 16:31 when most of the fans were getting prepared for overtime. Lloyd Shepherd started the play with a pass to Howatt, Howatt relayed to Whitlock who was left unguarded in front of Roper and Burke picked the open corner.  
That set the stage for Whitlock's clincher in the last minute.

BOSTON (AP)—First-place Detroit Red Wings snapped out of a six-game winless streak to defeat Boston Bruins 4-2 Thursday night by capitalizing on the stickwork of Alex Delvecchio and two crucial Bruins' penalties in a National Hockey League game.  
Delvecchio contributed two goals and an assist to the victory, which moved Detroit five points ahead of idle Montreal Canadiens. Boston's title aspirations were chilled, as they remained three points back of Montreal.

### B.C. BEATEN TWICE

# Alberta Remains Only Unbeaten Curling Rink

KINGSTON, Ont. (CP)—Alberta remained the only undefeated rink in the Canadian Curling Championships Thursday night after a suspense-filled day that saw two upsets and a heart-breaking final end muffed by Saskatchewan skip Garnet Campbell.  
Given a bye in the morning seventh round of the 10-game tournament, the Edmonton rink skipped by 30-year-old Matt Baldwin scored three on the last two ends to send aside Northern Ontario 11-8 and run its victory streak to seven straight. But the double loss suffered by British Columbia and the Saskatchewan skip's miss provided the thrills.

The in-and-out B.C. rink from Trail started Thursday's competition with no losses in six starts. That was soon changed. Saskatchewan, with a tremendous five-rock ninth end, whipped B.C.'s Reg Stone quartet 13-11 in the seventh round and Ontario followed with an upset 12-9 decision in the eighth.  
Saskatchewan took on Manitoba in the afternoon round and in a red down-to-the-wire battle lost 10-9 to the Winnipeg skip skipped by Howard Wood, Jr. The game was marked by Garnet Campbell's lightweight final-end rock that gave Manitoba two and wiped out a 9-8 Saskatchewan lead.  
The situation for Campbell's heart-breaker was set up in the 11th when he settled for a dead end that would give him the flag rock on the 12th.  
Manitoba built up a two-house with both stones at the back on the red circle. Garnet needed only to draw in but his short barely shafted one Manitoba stone and rolled over, leaving the Manitoba rock hitting the edge.  
Earlier, in the seventh round, New Brunswick created an upset when the Saint John rink pulled out a 14-8 victory over Manitoba for its first triumph in the 11-round tournament.  
Apart from New Brunswick's win, the seventh round was tame compared to the action provided later in the day.  
British Columbia, which had to come from behind four times in winning six earlier games, rolled up a 5-1 lead over Ontario after four ends and it appeared to the crowd of about 2,000 that the westerners were in.  
The Ontario rink, skipped by Stan Grant of Orillia, came to life with a three-rock fifth end and the fight was on. Sarjeant added doubles in the seventh and ninth to go ahead for the first time—8-7. B.C. scored one-rock ends in the 10th and 11th to take the lead 9-8.
