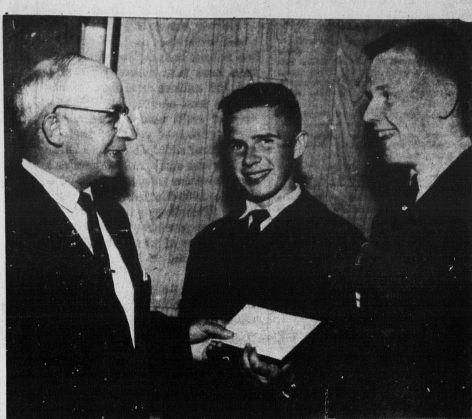


More Co-Operation Needed For Success Of Boys' Club

Eastern Firms Taking Look At B.C. Business Situation

VANCOUVER (CP) — Business in Eastern Canada has been increasingly aware of British Columbia in the last six months, says J. Allyn Taylor of the Ontario Business Council.

"It is only in the last 48 hours that I have got a proper appreciation of your (B.C.'s) potential," he said in an interview. "I flew to the Peace River to see the power project. That power will open up the interior in a way that people in the east don't appreciate."

"There is more awareness of B.C. in the last six months in the east than ever before, businessmen are making more trips out here. Mr. Taylor is here to attend the first board meeting of his company, a new B.C. and seven-storey office building in conjunction with the company's expansion.

Trust companies are emerging from "stagnation" and conducting business and their offices are shedding a former "formidable" appearance, he said. "I wonder if it doesn't stem from the tremendous demand for credit?"

REMARKABLE GROWTH He said the demand for credit in British Columbia has resulted in a remarkable growth record in the firm, which undertakes 20 per cent of its total business in the West coast province.

CLW Ferries Report Another Good Month

MONCTON — Canadian National Railways Northumberland 60 hydrographers of the Canadian Hydrographic Service have left Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, in May this year. In all the ferries handled a total of 26,972 passengers. In May, this was 5,972 more than in May 1953. The total number of vehicles carried last month was 16,333, some 2,828 more than last May.

Four ferries were in operation during the month and made a total of 724 crossings. MV Abegweit made 79 crossings, SS Prince Edward Island 335, MV Confederation 372 and SS Scotia 2 made six crossings. MV Abegweit was off the route for the greater part of the month undergoing repair.
