Sweden Builds Underground Naval Base As Answer To Atomic Age Challenge

STOCKHOLM (AP)—Sweden is building one of Europe's major naval bases underground. To answer the challenge of the atomic age, the Swedes also are blasting their biggest naval repair yards into the heart of a granite island in the Stockholm archipelago.

This project involves the total transfer of Stockholm naval base and yards to atom-bomb-proof underground facilities at Harsjaerden, 15 miles southeast of the capital. For defence of the base the Swedes will put in some of their most modern weapons, including Swedish-made medium-range guided missiles—"coastal robots" as they call them here. They are designed primarily for defence against an attacking enemy navy.

The new naval base is under construction in an extensive island system already bristling with fortifications, submarine pens and underground harbors where destroyers can sail straight inside the granite mountains for protection and repairs.

Using special blasting techniques the Swedes are building the biggest shipyards—in number of docks—in all Sweden inside the solid rock of Muskoen Island. Also inside the same mountain will be a major part of what was formerly the Stockholm naval base. Another part of it will be accommodated in similar installation at Berga, across Harsjaerden bay.

Sailing through the Muskoen base area on board a Swedish cruiser, you can see lights gleaming deep inside the rock which hides what is claimed to be the largest man-made mountain caves in the world. Virtually nothing else of these giant subterranean construction works can be seen from the outside.

The total size of these underground structures is a military secret. The docks are specially designed to offer full protection against the atomic bomb and a very large measure of protection against the hydrogen bomb.

There are about 500 underground command posts in the country for the armed forces and the civil defence organization. All are inside granite mountains. Oil and ammunition stores and some war industries are also underground.

Life Expectancy For Females Still Gains

OTTAWA (CP)—Babies born today can expect to live longer than babies born 20 years ago with the increase in life expectancy greater for girls.

A new Canadian Life Table published today by the Bureau of Statistics shows that 84 years have been added to the expected life span for females since 1931, compared with 6 1-3 years for males.

In 1931, the life expectancy for females was slightly more than two years longer than for males. In 1941, the margin rose to 3.2 years and in 1951 to 4.5 years.

DECLINES WITH AGE Since 1931, 2 1/2 years have been added to the life expectancy of a five-year-old male, 1 1/2 years to a 20-year-old, almost half a year to a 40-year-old and a bare three months to a 50-year-old compared with 6 1-3 years for a newborn infant.

During this period, life expectancy for a five-year-old female gained more than 5 1/2 years; for a 20-year-old more than 4 1/2 years; 2 2-3 years for a 40-year-old and 1 1/2 year for a 60-year-old compared with 8 1/2 years for a newborn female.

The improvement in life expectancy, particularly among children and adolescents, is due mainly to the substantial reduction in recent years for mortality from infectious diseases, the bureau said. On the other hand, diseases associated with middle and old age are much less amenable to control. It is therefore unlikely, the bureau said, that improvement in life expectancy in the future will be comparable to that of the last two decades.
