Crop Insurance Details Complete

Crop insurance applications will be ready for P.E.I. potato growers as soon as the necessary forms are printed, Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said yesterday.

The last remaining wrinkles were ironed out in meetings the minister had last week at Charlottetown with the appropriate federal officials, it was learned.

Mr. MacRae would not speculate on the measure of interest that potato growers are showing in the scheme. "For that, we'll just have to wait and see," he said.

But there are reasons why growers should be interested in the plan that will guarantee payment at something more than one dollar per bushel, for crops that are less than the agreed average of 150 per acre. The understanding is that no other type of assistance will be available for potato growers when crop failures may develop from various causes, if they fail to take advantage of the insurance scheme.

The agreement on crop insurance has not yet been signed, but that is only a formality, it was suggested by the minister, who said the important fact is that the final "wrinkles" have been ironed out.

The insurance premium will run around five dollars per acre, but Mr. MacRae was unable to state definitely if it would be exactly that amount.

Island Spud Shipments Increased

Potato shipments from this province are up considerably over this time last year, and P.E.I. spuds continue to command a big premium over competitors, it was stated yesterday by Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae.

The equivalent of 5,079 carloads of spuds had been shipped up to last Friday, which is 332 carloads more than had been shipped at the same time last year.

The figures are given in carlot equivalents, as a large part of the potatoes went by boat and truck shipments.

The information is from the marketing and information section, production and marketing division, Canada Department of Agriculture.

P.E.I. spuds are commanding a premium of 20 to 25 cents per bag over New Brunswick potatoes on the Montreal, Toronto, and Ottawa markets, and they are commanding a 40-cent premium over local potatoes on these markets, the minister added.

"This is partly due to the excellent pack our people are putting up," said Mr. MacRae, who observed that it is unfortunate the price is not higher so that Island producers could get more for their product.

Schedule Change Awaits Approval

No approval has yet been received by Maritime Central Airways from the post office department concerning flight changes proposed by the airline.

A MCA spokesman said yesterday, however, that there was no anti-change feeling and it was simply a matter of getting the necessary approval. He said that once a change is approved, the schedules will be altered to suit the needs of both the public and the post office.

The new schedule will probably go into effect sometime this year although it was said that schedule changes will depend on the arrival of the new Handley Page Herald as well as the post office approval.

Schedule changes would necessitate the discontinuing of the "early-bird" flight out of Charlottetown and the moving of three air crews and three stewardesses from Charlottetown to Moncton. The accounting office staff and the airport crew will remain here, however, it was stated.

VARIETY MARKS HARDWARE FAIR

TORONTO (CP) — Some 15,000 items are on display at the Canadian Hardware Show this week, including zaris, snaths and astrigals.

The show is not open to the public, but about 18,000 trade representatives are expected to make floor sales topping the \$1,250,000 of 1961.

Among new items on display are:

- A walking hose, consisting of a lawn sprinkler and hose reel on wheels which reel rolls up the hose to the tap, sprinkling as it goes.
- A can of compressed air for car tire emergencies.
- A powder for shaking on fish lures to make them glow in the dark—illegal in some parts of the United States but legal in Ontario.
- Incidentally, a zarf is an ornamental handle for a tea-cup; a snath is a scythe handle, and an astrigal is a weather-stopper for use between double doors.

Farm Enterprises Opens Abattoir At S'side Today

SUMMERSIDE — A modern abattoir will be officially opened at Summerside today by Farm Enterprises Inc., owned by four local men, prominently associated with agriculture, Charles Yeo, Arnold MacLennan, Lorne Driscoll and Lester Bagloe.

The new building located on the Green Road, just west of Summerside, is of concrete block construction, and is equipped with the most modern facilities.

It will provide custom service to livestock raisers, and will supply meat directly to food stores.

Additional to these services will be availability of meat from the abattoir in minimum quantities of a quarter carcass, to consumers who can have it cut and wrapped to their individual requirements.

All meat that passes through this abattoir is examined daily by a government inspector, assuring a safe, clean, quality product.

Among the equipment in the abattoir is an "auto-layer", and electrically operated skinning knife that rapidly removes the hides from the carcasses without damaging the meat or skin. The meat is then cut by power

MORELL
Morell last night adopted a budget of \$5,300 for the current year, providing for an estimated \$800 surplus.

The tax rate was set at one per cent, an increase of one-quarter of one per cent from last year. The total assessment is \$66,175.

Last year's operations left a surplus of \$665.35, the meeting was told. The budget originally voted for 1961 was \$5,700 but additional expenditure brought it to \$5,300. However, additional income was received from poll tax, non-resident tax and fire

Mr. Gallant reported that 11 regular meetings and two special meetings were held during the year. Land was purchased for the fire hall, which was moved over and placed on a cement floor to accommodate the two fire trucks.

The fire chief reported that two fire calls were answered within the limits and two outside. The department has two fire trucks with a total capacity of 1,300 gallons of water, and also a portable pumper and 1,500 feet of hose.

The coming year will see the Crapaud Village Commissioners looking into the possibilities of erecting a new house for the village doctor and also the building of a new heated firehouse.

This was decided at the annual meeting of the ratepayers of the village last night.

A revenue of \$2,965 was reported with expenditures totaling \$1,098.86. A balance of \$92 was noted after a loan payment of \$1,613.

Kenneth Paynter was re-elected to the commission to serve with commissioners Reginald MacLure, and Parker Canfield.

The ratepayers of the Village of St. Peters were told last night at their annual meeting that the village showed a surplus of \$146 for the past year. Receipts totalled \$3,174 and expenditures \$3,028.

It was moved that the fire brigade be re-organized and that the grounds around the fire hall be landscaped. It was also proposed to erect a sign in front of the fire hall. The fire chief is H.B. MacDougall.

The main project for 1961 was the purchase of the fire hall, which was remodelled, renovated and heating installed. A 1,000 gallon tank was installed on the fire truck.

R.L. Sanderson was elected to the commission to replace the chairman, D.G. Anderson. Colin MacDonald was elected the new chairman. The other commissioner is Joseph Louis. The clerk is Eileen Jackson.

A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Anderson for the outstanding work he has done during the past six years. A budget of \$1,300 was set for 1962.
