DAIRY PRODUCE.

Cheese Firm and Fairly Active
—Butter Heavy and Dull.

The Montreal Gazette reports that cheese retains its firm feeling, and the balance of the fall make is being rapidly taken out of our factorymen's hands from 8 5-8c upward to 9c, according to the section. At the wharf on Monday 2,500 boxes were offered, and all sold at 8 5-8c to 8 3-4c, an advance of 1/4c on last Monday's ruling.

THE PROVISION MARKET.

Chicago Irregular—Liverpool Steady
—Local Trade Fair.

Montreal advices state; A steady trade in a jobbing way continues to be done in provisions, and the market is moderately active, with no change in prices to note:—Canadian pork, in barrels, \$16 to \$16.50; pure Canadian lard, in pails, 8 1/2c, to 8 3/4c per pound. Ham, 10 1/2c to 13c, and bacon, 10c to 13c per pound.

The Chicago provision market for pork was steady, closing \$8 November and December, \$9.05 January. Lard was firmer and prices improved 2 1/2c closing \$4.92 1/2 November, \$4.95 December, \$5 January. Short ribs closed \$4.62 1/2 December, \$4.65 January.

There was no change in the Liverpool provision market. Pork, 50s; lard, 27; 3 1/2; boneless long cut heavy bacon, 31; long cut light, 30s 6 1/2; short cut light, 3 1/2 and tallow, 20s.

CHARLOTTETOWN MARKETS.

Slight Advance in Oats, and a Drop in Live Hogs.

The movement of oats and potatoes is fair, the former changing hands at 30c and the latter at 25c.

Hogs bring 12 1/2c, with the supply lessening. It is believed that upwards of 2,000 cases have been shipped abroad since last report.

At the pork factory the price of bacon hogs and heavy fats is the same, viz., 4c for each. This is a slight drop in the price of hogs.

For pork by the carcass the price ranges from 4 1/2 to 5c, with a good deal offering.

The farmers around here are busily engaged in ploughing and pulling their turnips.

The roads in this vicinity are in poor condition, probably owing to the wet weather.

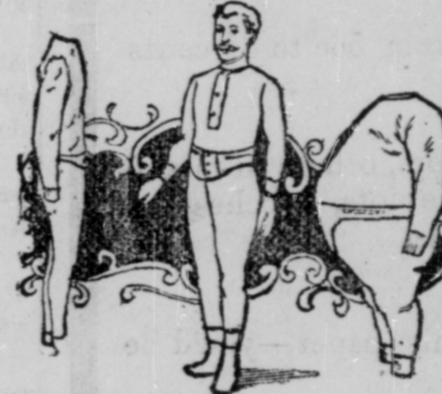
