

# Islanders Edged 2-1 In Game At Halifax

## Whitlock Gets 3 Points As Beavers Score 8-5 Victory Over Moncton

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 11 — (CP) — Saint John Beavers came back in the second period to trample cellar-dwelling Moncton Hawks 8-5 in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here Saturday night.

Hawks held a wide edge in play in the first period and outscored Beavers 2-0. But from there on the Monctonians were never in the picture as the goal-hungry Beavers rapped in seven tallies to Hawks one in the second period.

Beavers netted another in the final frame while the best the Hawks could muster was a pair.

Buck Whitlock, the League's leading scorer, had a goal and two assists for three points. Team mate Paul Platz led the Beaver attack with three goals and one assist to top the point getters. Other Beaver scorers were Eddie Bolan, Ted Watson, Nick Nicolie and Jack Thaler.

Sandy Air set up Hawks' first two goals, with Demchuk and Dunville doing the sniping. Other Moncton scorers were Roddie McKenzie, Gordie Miller and Fred Denny.

Saint Mary's squeezed out a close 2-1 verdict over Islanders at Halifax on Saturday night to end a big-three game series between the two leading Maritime Senior Hockey League clubs in the space of five days. It was the most number of times the two clubs have met in a single week this season and about three of the closest contests they have had with one another to date.

The Islanders were the big winners with two wins to one in the series, but were close wins in every instance, the locals nosing out Halifax 5-3 here on Tuesday, 6-4 at Halifax on Thursday, and losing the final encounter Saturday by a 2-1 margin. They were all rousing encounters too, that came up with smart hockey in every instance and went from one extreme to the other in the way of penalties.

In their meeting here on Tuesday, both teams had the book thrown at them in the penalty bracket that saw one of the largest number of awards, 23, handed out this season. Although the Thursday meeting at Halifax was expected to be a repetition of that earlier contest, it was comparatively tame with only fifteen handed out. In the final Saturday night go, both teams underwent an almost complete reformation when only five awards, one of the lowest of the season, were handed out.

A thing that is not often witnessed in a hockey contest was also a feature of the Saturday night clash—a scoreless and penalty free period. One may see one or the other, but seldom both in one frame. It took place in the first half and although the third was also a scoreless one, two penalties were handed out. Strange as it may seem, the only period that produced any scoring, the second, also came up with the most penalties. Three goals and three penalties.

For the third year in a row the Queen Square School hockeyists have proved themselves Masters in City Interscholastic Hockey League competition and will have the day after tomorrow this season of coping off the Provincial title for the second year in a row when they will meet Summerside High in the Island playoffs. Winning the City title will be the past three years and the Island title with it last year, it has been more than a fine showing that the Queen Square School teams have been making in recent years, and they are to be congratulated.

It was a close race this year with an aggressive Prince Street School hockey team, but the Q. S. S. boys wound up the first lap of their quest of hockey honors for the season when they walked off with the Queen Square School Club last night by an 8-3 count to nose out Prince Street School in the three-cornered series by one point for the Bike Shop Trophy, emblematic of City Interscholastic hockey supremacy.

One has been hearing considerable comment of late concerning forward George McGregor jumping the Halifax Saint Mary's Hockey Club last week for no apparent reason and returning to his home in Kingston, Ont. A Big Four meeting was held in Halifax yesterday, but according to reports of that meeting "nothing was done about McGregor." "But members said," states the report "that unless McGregor requests a review of his case within 48 hours, he will be suspended for the duration of the season and the C.A.H.A. will be asked to keep him out of hockey for at least another two seasons."

The report also stated that "nothing was done either about the status of M.S.H.L. players, Carnegie of Saint John and Bessette and Smith of Moncton, Charlottetown Islanders," the report concludes, "have refused to go on the ice if these players are used in the playoffs, and that the other three Clubs in the League, however, are willing to give them the green light."

## Queen Square Wins City Interscholastic Ch'ship

The Queen Square School hockeyists copped off the City Interscholastic hockey championship for the third year in succession here at the Forum Saturday night when they swamped West Kent School 8-3 in a wide-open, free scoring final league contest.

The victory gave the title and the Bike Shop Trophy to the Q. S. S. boys by a one point margin over Prince Street School, the other team in the three-team loop. Queen Square finished on top with three wins and a loss for six points. P. S. S. second with two wins, a tie and a loss for five points, and West Kent in the cellar with a tie and three losses for one point.

Q. S. S. led by a score of 4-1 at the end of the first, 5-3 at the end of the second and banged in three more without a reply in the closing session to wind it up with a five goal margin on the play.

Thane Doyle was outstanding in the nets for the Q. S. S. boys during hammering W.K.S. attacks while Forbes Kennedy, Jr., played a top brand of hockey for the losers to chalk up two of their three tallies.

The winning Q. S. S. squad will now meet the Summerside High School squad in a Provincial championship playoff series.

ANSWER TO DISGUSTED RE WILTSHIRE RINK

Sir, — Allow me space in your most valuable paper to enlighten the citizens of New Wiltshire and surrounding communities re a letter published in the sports column of your issue dated Feb. 6, 1951, signed "Disgusted".

Firstly Disgusted seems to have quite a yen for unwarranted criticism when he or she is very much opposed to the new board of management for being a well in order of securing a more up-to-date water supply. I would like to point out here and now that a near fatality was narrowly averted at the scene of the rink last season when a member of the old management luckily escaped death or being maimed for life when his new tractor overturned on the descent down to the creek where it was engaged in pumping water to flood the rink also causing approximately three hundred dollars worth of damage to his machine. This season the opening date was Jan. 31st with a game between the Charlottetown Y.M.C.A. and the Hampshire Bulldogs.

Now, when Disgusted comes saying that such a fine bunch of boys as the Hampshire Bulldogs would sell a grand night's sport and recreation for the paltry sum of one buck, that is the payoff. He or she does not hold them in the high esteem and sportsmanship of the bunch of boys that I think they are.

Now, just a few words in regard to the public address system. I cannot see for the life of me how it drew such a full house as Disgusted would try to make believe because ninety percent of the fans did not know it was installed until they came to the rink. So if Disgusted cannot take his or her recreation without a nine hundred dollar public address system, they should try something other than skating.

With the expense of erecting a new rink, keeping it in operation, paying the teams' transportation, installing a public address system and what ever else it costs, it is a pity that the pipe in the White House before it could be all paid for, and he will never do that.

Now I understand when this rink was erected it was to be a health and physical fitness centre for the younger generation, and if this old fogey wishes to try his or her skill on the blades, it was perfectly all right, but I do not think it was a very sporty gesture to try and stir up strife between the old and new management because I assure that both old and new managing groups are the finest bunch of sports you will find on P.E.I. or in Canada for that matter.

Now a word to the citizens of New Wiltshire. You have your rink; it is here to stay. You have the finest group of young people that can be found right in your own community and surrounding districts.

Old management and new management, pool your experiences, and as the proverb of old rightly said, "united we stand, divided we fall." Get behind your rink one hundred per cent and don't let idle gossip from any community try to break it up.
