### FATAL RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

Fifteen Persons Killed.

EMPERIA, Kansas, Sept. 9.—One of the worst railway wrecks in the history of the Santa Fe road occurred three miles east of here last night. A fast mail train east and the California express west collided head on. Fifteen persons were killed.

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—Walter Wellman, the American journalist and Arctic Explorer, was one of the passengers in the steamship New York, which arrived this morning. He had been in Norway and Russia to consult with Dr. Nansen and to arrange for a steamer and a large number of dogs. He said that efforts would continue to be made to reach the North Pole until the feat should be accomplished.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Sept. 7.—Captain Neilson, of the tug Pioneer, just returned from Dyea and Skaguay, says: "The half has not been told of the miserable trails by which the gold seekers are striving to cross to Lake Linderman. Captain Wasson, banker and ex-collector of customs for the Puget Sound district, is reported as being camped on the beach Skaguay with not one chance in five thousand of getting through this fall.
