The decisions of the Irish Land Court bear out strongly the contentions of the tenants that they are rack-rented. From a return of the work of the court in April it appears that the average reduction was 25 per cent. This exceeds the reduction demanded by the tenants in no case, except the Clanciarde estate, where the reduction asked was 30 per cent., and the reduction ordered was 35 per cent., and three other similar instances where the reduction asked exceeded 20 per cent. What can be the state of the country when the land courts, where the landlords have more influence than the tenants, in some few cases order a reduction even greater than the tenants demand?

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Estimates.

OTTAWA, May 9.

Sir Charles Tupper laid on the table of the House the estimates of the expenditure for the current year, and for the year ending June, 1888.

The expenditures on current account for the current year are \$342,136.50. The expenditures on current account for next year are estimated at \$35,041,855. The expenditures on capital account for current year are \$6,383,000.

The expenditures on capital account next year are \$7,279,000.

Next year's estimate shows an increase over this year in some departments. Under the head of public buildings, P. E. I. gets \$13,000 for Charlottetown.

The Flood in Fredericton. FREDERICTON, N. B., May 9.

The record is broken, and the oldest inhabitant is knocked clear out. The floods have risen eight inches in the last twenty-four hours. The water now covers the Officers Square all over and from Mr. Temples residence clear out of town going down river, the waters are up to the level of the street. Brunswick street is covered to a depth of two feet.

Collision With an Iceberg. HALIFAX, May 9.

The British steamer Palpa, Capt. Jones, from New York, May 4, for Sydney for coal, arrived to-night with her plates stove, by colliding yesterday with a sunken iceberg, off Scaterie, causing her fore compartment to fill with water. Captain Jones reports that he saw several steamers and vessels stuck in the ice.

Dillon and the Police. LONDON, May 9.

In case of John Dillon against police inspectors for assault and illegal seizure of money and papers some time ago, the Court of Queen's Bench adjudged the conduct of the police lawful.
