

Says Six Shots Of Salk Vaccine Needed For Young

ST. ANDREWS, N.B. (CP)—A top Canadian scientist says research indications are that children up to six years need four Salk vaccine shots to provide permanent insurance against polio instead of the standard three. Dr. Robert J. Wilson, assistant director of Connaught Research Laboratories in Toronto said in an interview here Saturday a fourth "booster" dose is needed about one year after the regular third shot is administered. Dr. Wilson, whose firm is Canada's main Salk vaccine producer, was here to address the annual meeting of the Canadian Paediatric Society which concluded Saturday. He said published reports had shown medical authorities were growing sceptical of the long term value of the vaccine. Researchers were experimenting on a new and stronger polio combatant. In an address to the meeting's 130 delegates, Dr. Wilson said a newly developed "vaccine complex" immunizing simultaneously against diphtheria, whooping cough, lockjaw and polio would be available in a few months. He said research had proved that immunization against polio with the complex was as satisfactory as that achieved by the Salk vaccine alone.

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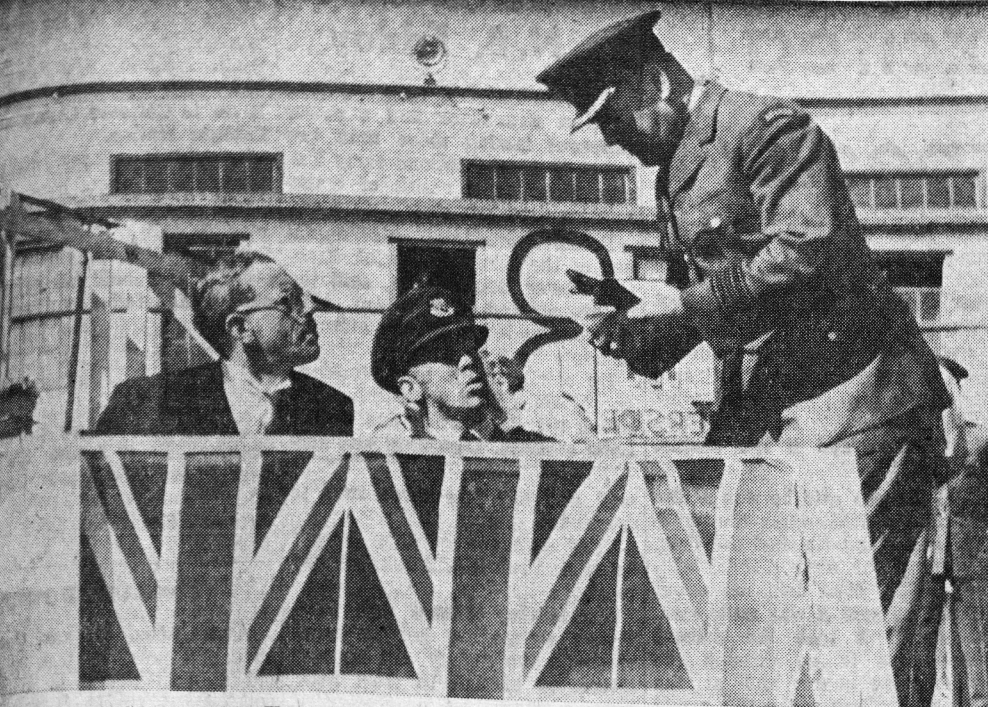

North Africa Rebels Meet Today To Decide On Policy

By ALEX VALENTINE TUNIS (Reuters) — Algerian insurgent leaders meet here Monday with Tunisians and Moroccans in an attempt to heal internal differences threatening unified Arab North African policy. The focal point of the three-day conference will be the question of the establishment of a "government in exile" by the Algerian Liberation Movement (FLN), spearhead of the Moslem war against the French. This point seems likely to lead to sharp differences between the Moroccans and Tunisians on one side and the Algerians on the other. Algerian insurgent sources make it clear they want a "liberation government" as soon as possible. Tunisian sources, while declaring sympathy "in principle" with the idea, feel the moment is not "propitious." The Moroccans are believed to share the Tunisian view.
