loved to get so bad after they took off a jitney. Mr. Macdonald continued, "What will happen to it when they take off the present poor passenger service? It may mean that in 5 or 10 years we will not have a roadbed at all."

Section 6 of the Railway Application states that a new daily Sunday excepted service will be operated from mid-April to mid-December to provide Summerside with a mixed train passenger service to connect with Train 39 out of Charlottetown. "This" Mr. Macdonald said, "is not new, we already have it."

In Section 8 it states, "service as traffic may warrant". Mr. Donald advised the shippers of this Province to give this paragraph very careful consideration and study.

Section 9 says that the present bus service is giving service five year round to all areas on Prince Edward Island now served by the railway. "What about the stations on the island now served by the railroad and by the bus?"

He noted from press reports that the operating deficit in the car ferry service at Borden and Tormentine is about half million dollars annually. "If we were to grant the request of the C.N.R. to have a passenger train service on the island, how do you know that the management won't be back in the next few years seeking permission to abandon the car ferry services at Borden and turn it over to the Northumberland services and thereby save the half million."

PUBLIC INTEREST

In Section 17 it states that the granting of this application will be in the public's best interest. Who ever heard of a public service being discontinued no matter how poor, in the best of the public?

Mr. Macdonald recalled that when the Borden-Tormentine ferry rates were lowered in 1941, the automobile traffic increased from 25,000 to 40,000. With passengers from 157,000 to 185,000. With new boats on this run, the railway cars handled have tripled over the past 30 years. This all helps to add to the revenue of the C.N.R. and the people of this Province, and this by improvement not by curtailment.

"It is a very serious matter", Mr. Macdonald said, "for someone who receives about \$50,000 and expenses and perhaps more, to say that the people of the island have left the railways as far as passenger travel is concerned and we have lost \$100,000 by them so doing. But I want to say in all fairness to the people of this Province that the never left the railways. The opposite is the true picture of the thing. The railways left them sitting on the cold seats of their cars for so long that they had no alternative but to leave them. So I say, who left who? It takes as long today to go to Tignish from Charlottetown as it would take a person from Quebec Province to go from Montreal to Ottawa, and the same is true on the Murray Harbour route."

"If the management is really sincere about saving money, — and that seems to me to be the only argument they have in their brief to the Board,—why make the same mistake over again in the building of more hotels and great cost to the country and want great opposition to the people already in the business? I will venture to say that the real loss, if its accounting is correctly done, on the hotel now in process in Montague will be much larger than on the Prince Edward Island annually."

What will be the alternative to the service that we are now getting, Mr. Macdonald asked. "A freight once a week perhaps, and mind you, it won't only be the merchants of this Province that will lose out when the employees of the C.N.R. start feeling the pinch of unemployment, it will be every family in this Province, and remember I told you so. WOOD ISLANDS SERVICE
Mr. Macdonald went on to express his appreciation of the Federal Transport Minister's announcement last year that his department intended to build a new ferry for the Wood Islands route.

As he had stated many times in the House, no private company would have the capital to do this; and he knew the present operators of this service could not spend the money that it is needed to make the service what it should be for the travelling public. He felt sure that with the added improvement, the public will be served as faithfully with its present equipment as in the past, and that it will be a Canada-wide benefit from a transportation standpoint.

He expressed appreciation also of the co-operation of the Government in the assistance offered to the people of Spring Park and Parkdale in solving their problem of water supply and sewage disposal. It is necessary that the top level of government interest itself in the affairs of its communities, especially in facilities of this kind, which are closely associated with health and happiness of all our people. He was convinced that a good start has been made and that something will come of it.

"Another problem that has been giving concern to the people in this area surrounding the City is Education", Mr. Macdonald added. "The people in Unit 1 and 2 are now faced with the necessity of more classrooms and it is thought by the Trustees in this area that a separate high school to serve the whole district would be the best idea. I have heard many different opinions expressed and I think the best way to find out just what the people want would be by ballot where the majority rule. If this had been done when the unit was first started there would be very little to complain about today. I have every faith in the elected trustees and I know how they feel in accepting the responsibility of acting on behalf of the entire community."

In his opening remarks the Minister who represents the Fifth District of Queens, referred to the Charlottetown centennial celebration and made reference to the achievements of earlier citizens, to the importance of the city as the capital of the Province and to its progress and development. He also complimented the Mayor and members of the City Council, the chairman of the Centennial committee and all concerned in the success of the centennial program.
