THE BEHRING SEA SEIZURES.

Talk of a Washington Official.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.

Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Trichron, in a talk with a reporter about the Behring Sea seizures, said: "There will be no child's play about this administration. The officers of the Revenue cutters in Behring Sea have plain and unequivocal orders. They will seize every vessel, American or British, found violating the laws. Great Britain claims a right to the fisheries, it is true; but Great Britain is in the habit of claiming everything. All ideas of redress or indemnity under the circumstance is absurd. The matter will be treated as a small trespass."

Canadian News Notes.

OTTAWA, Aug. 1.

Sir John Thompson left for Quebec this evening.

The creditors of the town of Emerson, Man., are urging the Dominion Government to disallow an Act passed by the Manitoba Legislature, wiping out that town's municipal debt.

Telegrams from Victoria, B. C., represent that there is intense excitement there over the seizure of sailing vessels in the Behring Sea. A public meeting was held there last night, at which resolutions were adopted and telegraphed to the Dominion Government.

Sir Somers Vine, secretary of the Imperial Institute, arrived here to-day to interview the Dominion Government on the question of granting aid towards that institution.

A large number of Equal Rights Association delegates left here to-day for Quebec to interview the Governor General regarding the Jesuits Bill.

Salisbury Refuses.

OTTAWA, Aug. 1.

A special cablegram says that Lord Salisbury had refused to entertain the proposition made by Sir Charles Tupper that the Imperial Government should summon a conference of colonial delegates to consider a double-barrelled or discriminating tariff between the various British possessions. In reply to the request of the Federationists, Lord Salisbury said that to summon a convention in the manner proposed, would leave it to be inferred that the Government considered a discriminating tariff scheme practicable. This answer has made the Federationists furious. Sir Charles Tupper had, previously to receiving Salisbury's answer, been elected a member of the Executive of the Imperial Federation League.

An official of the Brotherhood of locomotive Engineers has stated to a reporter that, as a recent meeting of the Western Division Brotherhood, the question whether or not the Engineers should include all classes of employees, was decided in the affirmative by a large majority.

The great chancery suit brought by Connel and McLellan, contractors, against the C. P. R. Co., has been decided in favor of the plaintiffs, who have been awarded \$257,000.

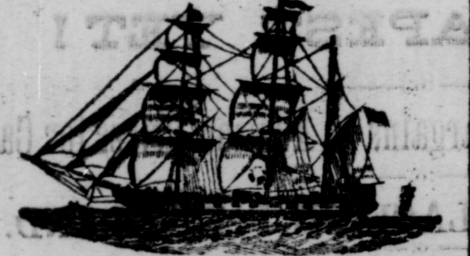
